## LOCAL BRIEFS

REV. G. M. CAMPBELL preached at Vernon River yesterday morning, and at Cherry Valley in the afternoon.

THE Victoria Colonist April 30th says: F. Peters, Ex-premier P. E. I., passed through the country to-day on his return to the Coast.

THE Presbytery of P. E. Island meets in St. James' Church to-morrow (Tuesday). In the evening at 7:30 a public service will be held, at which Messrs Coffin and Ross will be licensed.

ALL boys connected with the Baptist congregation are urgently requested to meet at the Baptist school room, on Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock, to join in the organization of a Boys' Brigade.

BEAR in mind the fact that Miss Lefurgey's recital is to be held on Thursday evening, 18th inst. In addition to a very fine list of selections by Miss Lefurgey, there will be musical numbers contributed by Prof. Watts, Mrs. Watts, Miss Earle, Mr. Chas. Earle, and Miss Hettie Collings.

REV. D. B. McLEOD was confined to the house by a severe cold yesterday and was unable to conduct the services in Zion church. The morning service was taken by Rev. D. McNeill, and the evening service by Rev. T. F. Fullerton. Mr. T. C. James occupied the pulpit in St. James church yesterday evening.

THE Herald, Fredericton, of May 6th says: Andrew Dunlap of Middle Hainesville, has purchased from John Richards, of Summerside, P. E. I., the handsome draft stallion, Woodburn.

The animal arrived here by boat Wednesday and is now at Long's hotel stables. Woodburn is a pure bred Clydesdale, stands 17 hands high and weighs when in condition 1850 pounds. He is one of the heaviest as well as one of the best bred horses ever brought to the province.

At the First Methodist Church yesterday morning Rev. G. F. Dawson, of Cornwall, preached a very forcible sermon, taking for his text 1st Cor. 6:20. In the evening Rev. G. M. Campbell, after the usual discourse, made special reference to the death of the late Judge Alley, remarking that numbers of people at the church doors where he had officiated in the morning and afternoon, had received the news of his death with tears. He recalled the fact that precisely two years ago the Judge was received into membership in the church, and partook of his first communion. At the close of the service Prof. Watts played the Dead March.

THE morning service in St. James' Church yesterday was somewhat of a memorial service, occasioned by the sad intelligence lately received, announcing the death of Rev. Dr. Thos. Duncan, who, for twenty years, ministered to the spiritual wants of St. James' congregation. Rev. T. F. Fullerton, the present pastor, preached from the words, "He being dead yet speaketh," taken from Heb. 11:4. The sermon was a masterly effort, and one that will long be remembered by the members of St. James', many being deeply affected by the tender and loving reference to the life and work of the deceased clergyman. As a fitting close to the impressive service the organist played Beethoven's beautiful funeral march.

MR. J. D. REID has received a letter from his son Percy Reid, who is about sixteen miles from Dawson City, developing a claim on the Yukon. The letter is dated March 14th, and was six weeks in reaching Charlottetown. He speaks of receiving a letter from Mr. Hood, dated January 30th, on March 13th, and was surprised at the short time it took to reach Dawson. He says he had not felt the cold any more than he had on P. E. Island, although the thermometer ranged from 90 to 40 degrees below zero, owing to the dryness of the air. Mr. Reid is in partnership with a gentleman from Vancouver, B. C., and he has decided to remain in that country.

THE GUARDIAN would gladly give more space than can be given this morning to two sermons of much more than ordinary interest and impressiveness preached in Grace Church yesterday by Rev. William Dobson of Halifax. Many from other congregations joined with the regular attendants filled every available seat. The morning sermon was founded on John 17:3, "And this is life eternal that they might know Thee, the only true God and Jesus Christ Whom Thou hast sent," coupled with the central thought in Genesis 1:25-31 "So God created man in His own image," &c. The evening discourse was from John 19:18, "Where they crucified Him and two others with Him, on either side one and Jesus in the midst."

OBITUARY.—The pioneers of our church, the strong, brave, good men, who bore the heat and burden of the day from the past generations are gradually being gathered to their fathers, but their memories will long be held in loving remembrance. Prominent among those whose life was associated with the growth of Presbyterianism in Richmond Bay congregation, East and West, for the past half a century was Alexander Ramsay, who departed this life, at his home, Tyne Valley, on the 25th inst. at the advanced age of 93 years. Blessed with a strong constitution which he consecrated to the service of the Master, he retained his vigor of body and mind to an unusually advanced period of life. His father emigrated from Kintyre, Scotland, to Malpique. After remaining there a while he went to the United States and served in the Revolutionary war. At its close he returned to the Island, got married and settled at Cape Lot 16. Mrs. Gordon, the mother of the two Missionaries whose blood was shed on Eromanga was his daughter, a sister of the deceased. During the pastorate of the Rev. J. M. McLeod (now of Vancouver C. C.) about 50 years ago he was ordained to the office of Ruling Elder at Lot 14 church, and retained that position in Richmond Bay West after the division of the congregation into East and West. He, with a number residing in the west part of the congregation on account of the distance to the church at Lot 14, deemed it advisable to build a meeting house at Tyne Valley. Their wise selection of the site and their faith in the future of Presbyterianism can justly be appreciated and admired by those who remember the little band who began to build and the large congregation who now worship within its walls. His worthy partner in life preceded him some years ago, but his four sons and four daughters all survive him. Truly a good man his ceaseless labors and has fallen asleep.
