FITNESS DEMAND CAUSES SURPRISE

Many Canadians at Home did not Realize how Important Perfect Condition Looks at the Front.

OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—The operation of the Military Service Act, as it has been explained in the press by the Military Service Council, has aroused considerable interest throughout the country. Many people, according to reports reaching official quarters here, are surprised at the importance assumed by physical fitness in the making up of armies for active service.

As a matter of fact, physical condition is all important in the case of a soldier, explains a high official of the Militia Department. You will rarely find a veteran soldier who is not possessed of an extremely strong constitution. For the onerous duties of fighting in the trenches, men must be in a perfect condition and that is why a certain percentage only of many thousands of reserves is available at any time for immediate reinforcement. Men who are not in category "A1" when the call comes cannot be taken.
