INTERESTING ICE RACES SATURDAY AFTERNOON

Over a very sloppy sheet of ice the Charlottetown Driving Club held their races Saturday in the morning the ice seemed to be in good condition, but towards afternoon as old Sol rose higher in the heavens and his rays descended on the ice it melted and made it very uncomfortable for drivers and horses who competed over it. At times the drivers could scarcely see where they were going so plastered were they with slush, and their clothes were dripping with water when they finished the heats. However, it provided pretty good sport for the spectators who were there in sleighs, carriages, autos, on foot and on skates to witness it. The weather was warm and pleasant which made it agreeable for all in that respect. Many had a grand stand view from the bridge and banks of Southport the finish of the course having been shifted to near that side of the river. Some good trotting and pacing was done and many surprises and upsets came, probably as a result of the unusual conditions.

The first race was the Class B Trot with the old standbys, Glenmorra, Baby Todd and Keltie and an added entry in the Exposer. Baby Todd won the first heat pretty handily, Keltie second and Exposer third, but the next two the veteran Keltie, whose name has been a household one on the ice and tracks of Prince Edward Island for the past ten years, showed that he has lost none of his pristine greatness by winning away off by himself the second and third heats and race. Keltie was the Keltie of old Saturday, never lifting his nose from wire to wire and showing an extra rush of speed when required. He is owned by Mr. John Murray and was ably driven by his friend Hughie Walker, and the two were the recipients of great applause as they crossed the line well in front of their opponents. Exchange.

In victory of old Keltie he is the same smiling gentleman, never puffed or never agrieved, taking the knock and victories with the same happy spirit. Let us hope that his good friend Keltie will continue his winning streak this year on the turf that he has so well started by his victory Saturday on the ice.

The second place in this race went to Baby Todd, who as mentioned before won the first heat in the second heat Glenmorra finished second, Keltie's wheel, but the next heat he only could make fourth place, the Exposer who had not had the advantage of any starts previous to Saturday, trotted well and there is no doubt that if he had more preparation that he would have made an even better showing, if not won the race.

Class C Trot.—There was quite a lot of interest taken in this race from the fact that The Pup had won on Wednesday in good time and apparently easy, and that Harry Todd, who has been in the great battle a few days previous, had won the first heat in this race. It was felt that in bringing these four horses together an excellent race would result. Whether due to the bad ice conditions or not, things did not turn out quite as expected and Eastern Lady won very comfortably in every heat. Her chief opposition in the first two heats being Frisco Direct, who was probably handicapped by the heavy mud. The Pup, of whom great things had been expected, did not trot up to form, his driver claiming that his shoes were dull and did not hold the ice. There is no doubt this would be a severe handicap. Harry Todd showed up well in the third heat a change of drivers evidently being to his benefit as he finished second not having been able to better fourth in previous heats.

The second heat there was no time taken, one of the watches failing to function. The winner, Eastern Lady, is owned by Mr. J. Power, and is a sweet, graceful, dainty little piece of horseflesh. Her friends from her section of the town were there in large numbers, all tickled to death with her win.

Class B Pace.—This class had four pacers and it turned out to be a very unsatisfactory race, as Mac Oia who was expected to be a winner or near winner, met with an accident to his hoppers in the first heat and another accident in the second heat which put him out of the race. Zua Baughman wins the race, but is not steady although she showed flashes of great speed. Her breaks getting away handicapped her considerably, although she finished second in the second heat.

The first heat was won by Prince Mac, but in the second and third heats he got tangled up in the slushy going and made wild breaks from which he could not recover sufficiently to put up an argument for second place. It was on Butcher Boy that the honors fell. This diminutive piece of horseflesh has not had any great advantages. He is youthful and has only known training since last June and that only in limited quantities. The unskillfulness of the weather the last month and nature's track on the ice gave him an opportunity for frequent workouts and he developed rapidly from mediocrity into a very notable pacer. No doubt he would have had a classier cognomen had greatness been expected of him, but Butcher Boy has been named and that will stick to him, for a horse once raced under a name must bear it for the rest of his days. He is something more than an ordinary pacer, as his third heat in 1:04.45 over that tire

kind of going proves. Mr. Steve Thorne who owns and drove him Saturday was a pleased personage, as were also the spectators who gave Steve the glad hand when he won lengths in front of his opponents in the second and third heats. It is wins like this that keep the racing game alive and make it so uncertain. They also act as an incentive to the small breeder and the man who has love for the horse to try and develop a winner. Our congratulations to Mr. Thorne whom we hope will have further continued success with his game little pacer.

Just here we would like to pay a tribute to the officials whose names appear below. These gentlemen have handled various meetings of the Charlottetown Driving Club this winter with dignity, courtesy and impartial fairness to all. It is not too much to say that their services are more than appreciated by the horsemen who raced and by the spectators who witnessed the contests.

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Mar. 8.—The foreign demand for Canadian grain here on Saturday was of a very limited character and on a side of sales of odd lots of low grade oats for March shipment to the United Kingdom business was dull. Owing to the further weakness in Winnipeg for oats, a much weaker feeling developed in the local market and prices were reduced three cents per bushel, Ontario No. 3 white being quoted at 61 cents and No. 4 grade at 57 cents per bushel, ex-store, while the undertone to the spring wheat flour market was weaker. No change in prices occurred, although this is expected in the near future. The trade in winter wheat flour was reported quiet and prices were unchanged. Little business was transacted in millfeed but the tendency was steady. The market for rolled oats was inactive. An active trade continued to be done in eggs. Owing to the lower prices ruling, however, Saturday's quotations were unchanged. A fair trade was done in butter and prices were well maintained. The cheese market was inactive with foder made.
