THERE were no passengers requiring vaccination on board the Minto Saturday afternoon.

THE Princess returned from Pictou early yesterday morning bringing an opera troupe.

JOHN Ross had the ends taken off the two middle fingers of his left hand at the Railway works on Saturday.

THE winter steamers Stanley and Minto will lay up today. When the bay and straits are free from ice the Stanley will place the buoys.

A TEST of the new Westinghouse air brake was made on the first train equipped Saturday morning between Charlottetown and Royalty. The test was most successful.

THE Minto made the round trip to Pictou Saturday reaching that port on return at four o'clock. She had no freight and only a few passengers besides those making the round trip.

JUDAS Fitzgerald will deliver a lecture under the auspices of the Young Men's Society in St. Paul's schoolroom tonight subject—"The present war and its meaning". Admission 15 cents.

CHIEF Sark was called home on Saturday to Lennox Island by telephone message announcing the serious illness of his nine year old daughter whom he left well when he came to the city several days ago.

NINE buoys on Connolly's wharf are being repaired and refilled for placing shortly. The work is being done by James K. Griffin and it will probably be a week or more before they are placed by the Stanley.

C. B. FOSTER, of the C. P. R., with several members of his staff, left last evening for Halifax, to meet incoming steamers. The Tunisian is due with 1,500 passengers, the Pomeranian with 385, the Milan, of the Franco-Canadian line, with 170, and the Kennington of the Dominion line, with 622. They will land at Halifax. George Hannah, traffic manager of the Allan line, will probably pass through from Montreal to Halifax, today. —St. John Telegraph.

THE City of London goes to Orwell today.

THE funeral of the late Mrs. Mayhew, Kingston takes place to-day at two o'clock.

THE new wiring in First Methodist was partially completed yesterday and the centre chandelier was lighted last night.

THE City of London made a quick trip and the first of the season to Victoria Saturday, returning in the afternoon at 2.30. She had large cargoes each way.

THE funeral of the late Mrs. Flood, Royalty, took place yesterday afternoon at St. Dunstan's Cathedral and thence to the R. C. Cemetery. There was a large attendance.

BEGINNING to-day the regular mails will go east in the morning train. A supplementary afternoon mail will go to Mount Stewart, Souris, Montague and Georgetown.

IT is expected that the Princess and Northumberland will today begin their spring service. The Princess will leave Charlottetown each morning at seven, returning during the evening.

THE remains of the late Mrs. Mayhew, daughter of James Beers, Kingston, whose death took place recently in Calgary arrived home Saturday by the Minto and were taken to her father's home.

CAPTAIN J. A. Farquhar has sold the excursion steamer Acadia to George and Frank Batts, of Charlottetown. Men have arrived and are fitting her out ready to sail the middle of next week.—Halifax Herald.

REV. JOHN McLEAN, Ph. D., Editor of the Wesleyan, Halifax, is announced to preach in the First Methodist Church next Sunday evening and will give one of his racy and interesting lectures on the following evening.

THE Stanley returned Saturday about half past ten from Summerside. The Captain reported much ice in the Straits between Tryon shoals and as far west as the eye could reach from Summerside. Point du Chene harbor was also reported filled with ice on Saturday.

REV. William Dobson, Windsor, the talented preacher who has been called to the First Methodist Church in this city, in conjunction with Dr. Sutherland of Toronto is the representative of the Methodist General Conference of Canada and Canadian Methodism at the Conference being held in Los Angeles, Cal.

WITH very commendable promptitude the new postmaster Hon. Mr. Whear on Saturday wired to Pictou to have the mails brought over by the Princess yesterday. The island thus has foreign mail which would not otherwise have arrived till tonight. A mail was also despatched by the Northumberland yesterday morning. As a consequence of the mail yesterday nothing but Nova Scotia mail will be received via Pictou tonight. The mails till after tomorrow will be sent by this route.

THE annual meeting of the Charlottetown Lawn Tennis club was held in the Y. M. C. A. on Saturday, where a large number of members were present, evidencing the great interest that will be taken in Tennis this summer.
