Two names were then placed before the committee and on a ballot being taken, James G. McLeod, of Bridgetown, was chosen, and is recommended as Inspector for this County. Mr. McLeod is a man of life long temperance principles, and is an uncompromising foe to the liquor traffic, and will, it is believed, give a good account of himself in this position.
