Cubs Knock Dodgers Into 2nd Place With 9th Inning 4-3 Victory

St. Louis Cardinals jumped a game on a half in front in the hot National League flag chase last night on pinch hitter Walter Sosa's two-run ninth-inning homer which gave the Red Birds a 3-2 victory over New York Giants and a sweep of a day-and-night doubleheader as Brooklyn lost a single game at Chicago.

A 15-hit attack on six Giant pitchers gave Cardinals a 13-8 victory in the afternoon contest when Manager Eddie Dyer's athletes broke the first place tie with Dodgers and took a full length lead.

Brooklyn's pennant hopes received a severe jolt at Wrigley Field yesterday as Chicago Cubs allied with two runs in the last of the ninth for a 4-3 decision that knocked the Dodgers out of the National League lead.

Combined with St. Louis' Cardinals success against New York, the setback dropped Brooklyn into second place with a record of five wins and five losses on their final western tour. They finish their javat with another single against the Cubs today.

Lou Stringer's double, scoring Mary Rickert, was the payoff of the Bruins' late spurt. Trailing 3-2 going into the last inning, Fenwick Lowrey opened with a single. Rickert doubled, scoring Lowrey and tying it up. After Bob Schefling had been given an intentional pass by Hank Behrman, Stringer broke a tie before anybody was out.

Paul Erickson, who took over after Johnny Schmitz had been lifted for pinch hitter Bill Nicholson, earned his eighth victory on a two-inning job.

St. Louis' outed its persistent New York Giants June 13-8 to regain undisputed possession of the league lead in the first game of a day-and-night doubleheader.

Assured of remaining in first place at least overnight, by the Dodgers' loss to Cubs, the Red Birds lashed out with a flurry of 15 hits that included four homers a pair off the bat of Ery Duke and one each by Whitey Kurowski and Enos Slaughter.

The Cardinals sent starter Ken Trinkle to the showers in the first inning and continued to blast Mike Budnick for a total of five runs on six hits as they batted all the way around and started over again.

It was Johnny Beazley's sixth win and the 11th defeat for Trinkle, the first of six Giant pitchers.

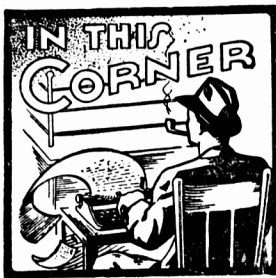
