LUSITANIA SURVIVOR DROPS WREATH INTO OCEAN TO KEEP ARMISTICE DAY.

S. S. MAURITANIA, Nov. 15.—A survivor of the Lusitania, sunk by a German submarine in 1915, today dropped a wreath in her memory into the seas as part of her armistice day observance of her sister ship, the steamship Mauretania.

The crew was mustered on the after deck under a grey sky. "Off to sea" was the order at a minute before 11, when two minutes of silence were observed. As the two minutes began, the flag was lowered to the bugle call "Last post." At the end of the period, "revellie" was sounded and the flag was hoisted to full mast. Then "Eggar's Land of Hope and Glory" was sung by a choir to the accompaniment of the ship's orchestra.

GIFT OF LAND TO BIRMINGHAM

Birmingham city council have accepted the gift of Messrs. Cadbury Brothers, Ltd., of 150 acres of land adjoining Birmingham University, 100 acres for a hospital and the rest for playing fields; \$25,000 also being given by the firm towards expenses incurred by the council in dealing with the land.

Modern Woman Becomes Mannish

BERLIN, Nov. 15.—The masculinization of women by means of bobbed-hair, mannish dress and participation in business and athletic pursuits requiring the physical stamina of men, soon may reach proportions of a menace to modern civilization, says Prof. Hugo Sellheim, noted sexologist of the University of Halle.

In an address which caused a sensation at the International Congress of Sexology, Prof. Sellheim described in detail one case of a woman who at the age of 43 metamorphosed into a being with all the appearances of a man.

"She showed a growth of beard," Prof. Sellheim said. "Her voice changed from a clear soprano to a deep bass. The lines of her face and the development of muscles became those of a man. Even her Adam's apple took on a pointed prominence. Children of the neighborhood hounded her with catcalls of 'witch.' I have no doubt that she would have been buried at the stake had she lived a few centuries before her time."

The same masculine development is fundamentally possible in all women, he said. The man-like dress and activities of modern women might be just enough to over-stimulate the growth of glands determining male characteristics at the expense of glands determining female traits.

Syncopation Is Called Foe Of Native Opera

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Music that moves the feet rather than the heart is retarding the development of American opera in the belief of J. Rosamond Johnson, pianist and exponent of the negro spirituals.

"The great fault of those who are trying to advance American opera is that they are taking trivial things—music that appeals to the feet rather than to the soul," Johnson said.

"Jazz is a great institution for the tired business man and others in need of relaxation, but there is little hope for its being developed into the poetry of symphony music, except to furnish jolly movements to more serious works."

HEAVILY INSURED WIFE CHARGES ATTEMPT TO KILL

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—George Lupina, former sailor, insured his wife, Helene, for \$10,000.

When she charged today, he tried to collect it.

The Lupinos and their flivver were fished out of the East River last night, Mrs. Lupina, somewhat hysterical, said her husband deliberately drove into the river to drown her. He can swim.

Lupina was in a hospital today, being treated for a broken arm and dismembered. He is held on a charge of felonious assault.

PUMPKIN VALUABLE AS FEED FOR COW

Pumpkins as a feed for dairy cows are especially valuable in late fall and early winter when no silage is available, according to A. E. Perkins, of the dairy department at the Ohio Experiment Station.

Tests at the experiment station have shown that pumpkins are palatable and are relished by cows and have approximately the same feeding value as beets and other roots and apples.

Do Not Overfeed.

The notion that pumpkin seeds reduce milk flow probably has arisen from attempting to make them supply too large a part of the ration. If fed alone it would require two or three hundred pounds of pumpkins per day more than a cow can eat, to furnish enough dry feed to meet the needs of an average milking cow.

Pumpkins are of greatest value when fed at the rate of thirty to sixty pounds a day in addition to good grain and hay ration. The seeds, instead of being poisonous or deleterious to milk flow are probably the most valuable part of the pumpkins.

Two Women Get Aviators Certificates

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Two more women have obtained aviator certificates at the Stag-line Aero-Plane Club. They are Lady Bailey, wife of the South African millionaire, Sir Abe Bailey, and Miss Norah O'Brien. Both are members of the London Flying Club and passed their qualifying tests in a two-seater Moth. The tests included landing and taking off, cutting figures of eight in the air, ascending to a specified height, and landing, with the engine shut.

LONDON SNOWFALL IS RECORD-BREAKER

LONDON, Ont., Nov. 15.—A new record for this district for all time was established by the snow fall in London during the 24-hour period ending midnight Wednesday. More than 17 inches of snow covered the ground today. The previous record, this was made during January some years ago. Country roads are blocked and trains and street cars are running.

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A Honeymoon Tangle

Seeing a soldier at work on a regimental garden in India and wishing to get first-hand information as to the popularity of gardening among his men, a certain general went over to him and began chatting in a casual way.

"The Tommy" had not the least suspicion who his questioner was, and when asked if the men liked gardening replied quite candidly: "Yes, sir, but the general here is a funny old chap, and we do it to please him. Y'see, his gardens be all right he never finds fault with other things."

This story is told in "Fifty Years of Army Music," a witty book of reminiscences by Lieut.-Col. J. MacKenzie Rogan, who was once referred to as the "pipewy Irishlander," because his father was Irish and his mother Scottish.

He enlisted as a band boy in 1867, rose to be Director of Music to the Colchester Guards and Senior Director of Music to the Brigade of Guards, whilst he is the only soldier-musician honored by the rank of Commander of the Royal Victorian Order.

At an hotel in the West country the author retired to bed at about 3.30 p.m. after a long day's journey, and was soon fast asleep. Suddenly he was awakened by a lady pulling at his arm. "Jack!" she cried (his name being Jack), "what do you mean, leaving me downstairs and going to bed? I don't believe you love me a bit. It's all a sham." In a deep-toned voice the musician managed to falter: "Madam, what do you want in my room? There was a wild shriek, and eaving open the door, the lady bolted out.

The hotel manager explained afterwards that a honeymoon couple had that morning given up the room he occupied and had gone on to an adjacent town. Failing to get a room there they had returned and, by mistake, the booking clerk told them that the room they had given up in the morning was still vacant.
