Yesterday afternoon the pupils of Notre Dame Academy entertained a large number of relatives and friends to a delightful "Hour of Irish Story and Irish Glory."

Among those present were His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, the Reverend Father Maurice MacDonald and Reverend Father MacAulay.

After the opening overture, "Hibernian Echoes" played by the Academy Orchestra of harpist, six violinists and four pianoforte duos, twelve small children in white dresses with a sprig of shamrock on their breasts recited in concert "The Green and Gold" which told why Ireland took these colors for her national flag.

The piano solo with variations "Believe Me, if All Those Endearing Young Charms," was splendidly rendered by Miss Kathleen Fitzgerald, who showed remarkable technique, fine shading and delicacy of touch.

The feature of the entertainment, however, was "Cleanings from Irish History in Song and Story," in which eight young ladies—Misses Gladys McCormack, Claire McCarey, Francis Connolly, Helen Keith, Hallie Brown, Jeanne Blois, Mildred Ranahan and Jean Bell—delighted the audience with the results of their late studies in Irish History.

His Lordship Bishop O'Leary at the close of the entertainment, thanked the young ladies and Reverend sisters for the most enjoyable afternoon. In brief but happy remarks he complimented the elocutionists, vocalists and musicians for their excellent performances, but took exception to one statement that "Only those whose names are prefixed by 'O' or 'Mc' are true Irish" by saying that he heard of good authority that every person was Irish from the fact that Adam and Eve were Celts.

Rev. Father MacAulay told the young ladies that they must have been studying out of the same book as he used for his St. Patrick's sermon for many of the facts and much of the material were very similar.

A most pleasant afternoon was brought to a close by the grand class finale "St. Patrick's Day."

\$16,000 PAID FOR CALF

At Aberdeen yesterday the most remarkable public sale of shortborns that has ever taken place in this or any other country was held in respect that the sum of 3200 guineas (\$16,000) was paid for the winner of the Dutille Cup for the best bull bred by the exhibitor. This figure constitutes a world record for a representative of the "red, white and roan" under one year. Only twenty-two hours previously, at Perth, that distinction lay with Duncan Stewart of Millhills, Crieff, who secured 3100 guineas for a Marigold for exportation to South America.
