AN ACCIDENT.—Mr. James Weir, Scotchfort had the misfortune to hurt his shoulder severely a few days ago by falling on the ice—S.

THE MAIL SPECIAL.—The Georgetown mail special returned to the city at 7.35 last evening, took on board the mail, passengers, express and freight for the steamer and left again at 8.45 p. m.

VISIT OF INSPECTION.—The Superintendent of Education, Mr. R. H. Campbell, is at present at Montagu inspecting the schools in that district. He is expected to return to the city tomorrow.

CLEARED ICE.—Mr. Hammond Kelly, Southport, has cleared of snow a portion of the East River ice near the Railway wharf, so that parties with horses may exercise and speed their animals in preparation for the coming speed contests.

EXCITING CATCH.—On Saturday afternoon the 17th, two sportsmen of Mt. Stewart started out on a hunting expedition. On the way to the place where they intended to make a reconnoitre, they had to cross a small brook, leading from a spring into East River. On crossing this brook, one of the men (whose powers of observation have been fully developed in detecting trouble in a gasoline engine), observed a huge fish in the water, it being so shallow, that a part of the fish's dorsal fin was above water. Having in their possession a small iron bar with a sharp point, they determined to capture him. The machinist took the bar and advanced to the edge of the stream where the fish lay, followed closely by his companion. They descended the sloping bank quite near the fish, the foremost firmly bracing himself in the snow, while his companion held on firmly to his left leg to prevent him from falling into the brook. At length the bar was raised and the fish received a tremendous blow on the back. In the commotion and chase that ensued, both men were completely drenched by the splashing of the water by the tail of the fish. Soon he (or she) returned to the place where he was first seen. Again a violent blow was dealt, this time on the head, which stunned the monster that the capture was easy. So they returned to the village in considerable elation of spirit, dragging a salmon weighing 164 pounds. One of the men, who is well informed on piscatorial habits declared they have captured the "spawner," and that the "meiter" is going to be the next victim.

Melban and Nicholson at Ottawa acquainting them with the hold-up in the steamer service between Charlottetown and Pictou, and strongly urging that the ice boats at the Pictou be immediately put in commission. In view of the conditions at Pictou harbor yesterday this appears to be the course to pursue.
