CANADA'S FIRE LOSSES HEAVY

TORONTO, Ont., June 6.—The Monetary Times estimate of Canada's fire loss during May amounts to \$2,123,868 compared with April loss of \$1,470,622 and \$2,251,815 for the corresponding period of last year. There were seven fires during the month in each of which the loss exceeded \$100,000. These were at North Sydney \$250,000; Moncton, Englehart Trenton (Ont.), Gretna, Plessisville and Edmonton. During May thirty-three lost their lives through fire, this is the largest number of fatalities since July 1911.

Almost every day The Guardian reminds of an advertising nature.
