IN MEMORIAM

MRS. (REV.) W. E. JOHNSTON

Hundreds of old friends throughout Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick will be deeply shocked to learn of the sudden death of Mrs. W. E. Johnston, of Calgary, Alberta, on January 20.

Mrs. Johnston had prepared the mid-day meal as usual, eaten it with the family, washed the dishes, dressed to go down town—all with her usual brightness; but was stricken on the way with an attack of heart trouble, from which she suffered slightly at times. She passed away inside of an hour—just stepping from her home here into the eternal safety of her father's house.

For 37 years Mrs. Johnston shared the joys and sorrows, as well as a mother's wife can of the people in the many circuits in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick where Mr. Johnston labored throughout all these years. All will recall her amiable disposition, her kindness of manner, her never failing hospitality, and faithful Christian character, manifest throughout the years when she was "our minister's wife"; always ready and willing despite the busy home-life, to be her husband's right hand in all the good work of church and community.

Since retiring from the active ministry of the Methodist Church, Mr. and Mrs. Johnston have resided at Kensington, P. E. I., and in Calgary—this last year at the Devonish Apartments, Calgary, with their daughter Mildred. Their other daughter Margaret, Mrs. Jamieson, also resides in Calgary; one son, Edward in Toronto; Scott in Winnipeg; and Harold in Rouleau, Saskatchewan.

Mrs. Johnston—Eliza S. Hayes, was born in Albany, P. E. I. in 1857, and was married to Rev. W. E. Johnston, then of the Bideford circuit by the Rev. T. J. Dolan, instead in Summerside forty-five years ago. One sister, Mrs. England, is still living in Bideford, P. E. I.

The late Mrs. Clive Baker of Kensington was a daughter, Ethel. The funeral service was conducted in the Armstrong Funeral parlors by the Rev. H. W. Aviston of Central United Church, of which Mrs. Johnston was a member assisted by Rev. H. H. Marr and Rev. W. E. McViney; numerous and beautiful floral tributes banked the entire end of the inner parlor. The remains were interred in the Burnside cemetery, Calgary.

The Karroo arrived a week ago from Calcutta via the Suez Canal with jute and rubber. She is a 420 foot vessel of 6,122 tons.

Would Fly to New Zealand From England in 7 Days

Day and Night Flying Considered By Captain Courtney in Attempt at Most Ambitious Long Distance Flight Proposed

LONDON, Jan. 21. - Captain P. T. Courtney, famous test pilot, is trying the most ambitious long distance flight yet proposed—an aerial voyage from this country to New Zealand by flying boat in about seven days.

He intends to fly day and night over stages of about 1,500 miles each, stopping only long enough at the end of each stage to re-fuel. The machine to be used for the flight would be probably a large twin-engine British flying boat, built to carry a heavy load, with a cruising speed of between 90 and 100 miles an hour. The route will be about 14,000 miles.

Captain Courtney won the Aerial Derby in 1920, and the King's Air Cup in 1923. He is best known in the flying world as a cool and resourceful test pilot.

Be blest with health, and peace, and sweet content. And oh! may Heaven their simple lives prevent From luxuries contagion weak and vile!

Then, however, crowns and coronets be sent, A virtuous populace may rise the while

And stand as wall of fire around their much-loved isle. O Thou! who poured the patriotic tide

That streamed through Wallace's undaunted heart; Who dared to nobly stem tyrannic pride,

Or nobly die, the second glorious part. (The patriot's god peculiarly thou art,

His friend, inspirer, guardian and reward.) O never, never, Scotia's realm

But still the patriot and patriot bard, In bright succession raise, her ornament and guard!"

These following lines were written by Burns on his birthday, 1793, when he had completed his thirty-fourth year.

Sing on, sweet thrush upon the bough Sing on, sweet bird, I listen to thy strain;

See aged winter 'mid his surly reign At thy blithe carol clears his furrowed brow.

So in lone poverty's dominion dreads Sits meek contempt, with light un-anxious heart,

Welcome the rapid moments, bids them part. Nor asks if they bring ought to hope or fear.

I thank thee, author of this opening day, Thou whose bright sun now glids your Orient skies!

Riches denied, thy boon was purer joys— What wealth could never give nor take away!

Yet come, thou child of poverty and care! The mite high Heaven bestowed, With thee I'll share."

Minister Makes Movie To Spread The Gospel

GARNAVILLO, Iowa, Jan. 24. - The Rev. K. W. Braun, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church here, has turned movie producer to gain the same end he seeks from the pulpit—spreading the gospel.

He produced and directed a film of the life of Henry Francis Lyte, author of "Abide With Me," started it on an exhibition tour of the country and now awaits the verdict of the public in his effort to popularize religion through motion pictures.

Picturesque Clayton county was the setting for the film, which was made in four parts. The first portrayed Christ's meeting with the disciples at Emmaus. The others are arranged about the themes "Hallowed Be Thy Name," "Thy Kingdom Come," and "Thy Will Be Done."

A film corporation cooperated in making the picture. Rev. Irving Maurer, president of Beloit College, and Dr. A. L. Meyer of Johns Hopkins University, assisted in the production.

Fear Collier And Crew Are Lost

(Canadian Press) BOSTON, Jan. 22.—An empty life boat bearing the name of the Collier John Tracy, ten days overdue from Norfolk for Boston, was picked up by the fishing schooner schooner 70 miles southeast of Highland Light, Cape Cod. Shipping men here expressed belief that the Tracy had been lost with all on board. The lifeboat was picked up by the fishing schooner Breaker, which communicated the news by radio to the Bay State Fishing Co. here. The John Tracy, which carried a crew of 27 men, was last seen off Pollock Rip Light this on January 11th fighting through the worst blizzard of the present winter. The Tracy was commanded by Capt. Rudolf Richter of Belmont, with Merton B. Clarke of Norfolk as first officer. The crew had been recruited from New England and from Norfolk.
