NEWPORT NEWS, Feb. 4.—After towing a disabled unknown schooner within a hundred miles of Cape Henry and then leaving her to an unknown fate, the British steamer *Romanian* from London to Port Arthur, put in here today for coal and lifeboats, with her log showing a terrific battle with heavy gales.

WANTS WINTER NAVIGATION OF ST. LAWRENCE

QUEBEC, Feb. 4.—William Price, chairman of the harbor commission, in an interview to-day, said he was strongly in favor of winter navigation, declaring that it was not only possible but practicable. He urged the authorities on many occasions to establish a line down the river and gulf and to Sydney and Newfoundland to show the world that both the River and Gulf of St. Lawrence could be successfully navigated throughout the year. So far, however, no notice had been taken of his suggestions.

THE CONNAUGHTS WILL COME BACK

OTTAWA, Feb. 4.—The announcement that the Duke and Duchess of Connaught will return to Canada has been received with general satisfaction at Ottawa, as the impression was prevalent at the capital that their royal highnesses would not return. It was felt that the duke and duchess' health was such that her return to England would mark the end of their term. When the duke was appointed it was understood that it would be only for two years, but the belief is now that if he returns it will be for the full term.

SIR WILLIAM MAY TO BE ADMIRAL OF BRITISH FLEET

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—A cable from London says that Sir William May, fifty-one years in the navy, will succeed Sir Charles Frederick Bontham as admiral of the fleet in March.

The program will consist of songs, music, dialogue and the fact, everything that goes to make a most enjoyable evening. Everyone is invited to attend and all are promised a good entertainment. NEW YORK TO REGULATE MOTION PICTURE THEATRES.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—Declaring that every vote against the immediate passage of his proposed ordinance to regulate motion picture theatres may be a vote for a death sentence for some poor unfortunate, Alderman Folke today appealed in vain for immediate action, on the measure, which if passed, he said, would prevent further tragedies similar to the East side panic of last Sunday night when two women were killed and a dozen or more injured. The Folke ordinance limits the seating capacity to 500, provides for ample aisle space and for rigid sanitary and fire inspection.

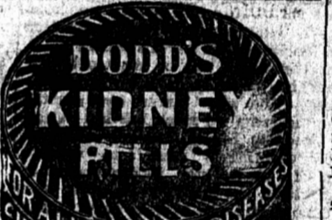
