BERLIN, April 9.—The question of whether President Hindenburg will accept a second term, and in case he does not, who will be victorious in the inevitable scramble which would follow his refusal to run, is causing politicians to pick up their ears and cast interested eyes at the gray walls of the Presidential Palace, and the thankless job waiting inside.

The fact that Hindenburg could return merely by indicating a willingness to do so, is generally conceded. Indeed, two or three movements have already been started for extending his term of office beyond the normal seven years, as a gesture of confidence. This would obviate the election scheduled for April, 1932. In case for some reason he declines, several possibilities arise.

The case is complicated almost beyond the point of conjecture by the German electoral system and the infinite possibilities for party combinations. The President is elected by direct vote of the people. If he is to win on the first balloting, he must have a simple majority. If a candidate falls short of majority, a second election must be held, at which an approximate majority is sufficient for election.

arise who might be able to muster enough strength to obtain a nomination. One of them, Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, former president of the Reichsbank, has for some time now had his caputted to the varying waves of the present political ether. The other is Dr. Hans Luther, former Chancellor and Finance Minister, now hiding down Schacht's former bank job, and losing no prestige in the doing of it. Mentioned also among possibilities is Dr. Otto Braun, Social Democratic Premier of Prussia.

Schacht Not Idle

Even with the election more than a year away, Schacht has not been idle. Whether his activity denotes an aspiration to the executive office, he has not yet indicated, but his recent trip to the United States, his book, "An End to Reparations," and the recent speeches, including his Stockholm declarations on the same subject, show that he will not be unprepared "in case a call should come."

He has perhaps the most effective campaign ammunition for popular appeal in the country today—revision—and with it he could bag Nationalist, and conceivably some other right-wing support, although his signature of the Young plan might make it hard for the Nazis to swallow him. Critics point out that ever since the preparatory Young-Plan conference at Paris, beginning with his objections at the final Hague conference, Schacht's activities have been directed toward perfecting his alibi for initiating the plan.

Luther's possibilities are far from remote. His March 1 speech at the Leipzig Fair, demanding financial help for Germany, might even be taken in part as a bid to forestall the former Reichsbank chief and show that Schacht is not the only one who believes in relieving the country of war burdens. Although he has so far given no indication, Luther appears as a good gambler for the government ticket.

FETES TO HONOR PROPELLER MAN

PARIS, April 9 (U. P.)—One hundred years ago, a native of Boulogne on the sea, Frederic Sauvage, invented the screw propeller, unsable in any fluid, but particularly as an instrument of propulsion under water for ships.

Scores of years later, this propeller became the main motive force of the airplane. Although John Ericsson took out his first patent for the screw propeller in 1836, it is authoritatively held that Sauvage made the first experiments in Boulogne a few years before Ericsson patented the idea.

To commemorate the event, Boulogne will hold a number of celebrations this summer in conjunction with English and Belgian organizations having governmental connections.

Although the program is not definitely concluded, it is certain that on August 20, the French Ministers of Air and of the Navy will be official guests of the city. A few days later, the French fleet will be invited to maneuver in the harbor, and permission will be asked for the public to visit the ships, now universally propelled with the screw wheel invented by a Frenchman.

It is expected that an important Franco-British regatta will also be organized.

The importance of the fete may be realized when responses come from the Elysee Palace, inasmuch as it is hoped the new President of France will make the celebration one of his first official visits, testifying to the great importance of the Centenary of the inventor, Sauvage.
