N. H. L. President Reviews Hockey In Major Loop

Frank Calder, President of the National Hockey League, reviewed the state of professional hockey in a major loop. He noted that the league is passing remarkably well despite economic stress, and that the cost of operating a high class professional team still remains relatively high. Calder also mentioned the importance of maintaining the quality of the game and the need for better refereeing.

Unheard of Figures
The \$7,500 baseball player, for example, is likely to participate in upwards of 150 games, barring accidents. His salary counterpart in professional hockey, on the other hand, is expected to take part in only 48 matches, each lasting at the most 70 minutes. Since few players actually play, because of the system of substitution, the full game, it will be found that not many players actually do more than thirty hours of service on the ice during the season. The computing of the cost per minute to the club in both cases is a matter of simple arithmetic.

ecting a legislative vehicle to carry it into effect. One of the serious stumbling blocks is expected to be whether the dominion or the provinces or both shall contribute the state's share. Premier Bennett—and he has found support in several provincial premiers—a scheme where the employed, the employer and the state contribute on a pro rata basis. But in his pronouncements, the Prime Minister has not defined the word "state" or indicated whether he expected the provinces to assist the Dominion in this day of falling governmental revenues this question is expected to be somewhat explosive. Overlapping of Dominion and provincial taxation fields is another subject that may disrupt harmony. Admitting on one hand the hardships imposed on taxpayers through overlapping, each government points to its falling revenues and registers extreme reluctance to relinquish any taxation field at this time. For instance the provinces have built extensive highway systems—Ontario's cost \$150,000,000—and tax gasoline issue licenses and driving permits to obtain revenue. This is reflected in steam railway deficits which, in the case of the Canadian National, must be found by the Dominion treasury. In 1931 the aggregate revenue to all provinces from taxation of distribution and operation of motor vehicles was \$42,000,000—about the average drain on the Dominion treasury for the past seven or eight years from Canadian National Railway deficits. Double taxation has crept into the income tax field. And long as it is in the background is the old problem of provincial subsidies—another subject that may lead to prolonged debate, not on principle but on detail.
