SAYS GERMANS HAVE FRENCH PRISONERS CLOSELY CONFINED

DIJON, France, Dec. 3.—That Germany still retains French prisoners of war in close confinement is the claim made by Louis Boucher, a French volunteer of the 1920 class, who was made prisoner at Villers-Bretonneux, June 6, 1918, and returned to his home here today. Boucher declares that he, with two comrades, was tried before a court-martial for attempting to escape and was sentenced to ten years' imprisonment in a fortress. He was taken to Danzig, the other two being sent to Koenigsberg. The French mission to Berlin, which visited the Danzig fortress discovered, according to Boucher seven prisoners in solitary confinement and had them released. Boucher was among those given their freedom. French war office records carried the word "disappeared" against the name of Boucher, who had been unable to communicate with his relatives after his capture.

TWO MARRIAGES WERE ANNULLED.

MONTREAL, Dec. 1.—Two marriages were annulled by judgment of the superior court. In the first instance, Thomas McDonald petitioned to have his marriage with Sarah Evans set aside because it was not valid under the law of the Catholic Church. He is a Catholic, and he said he was married to Miss Evans on March 16, 1917, at St. Stephen's (Anglican) church, Lachine. He said he had no dispensation from the Catholic church authorities to get married in a non-Catholic church. Proof having been put into the record that the marriage had been declared invalid as regarded by the Catholic church, and there being no contest on behalf of Sarah Evans, named as respondent of the petition, Justice Coderre gave judgment declaring the marriage null and void. In the second case, the petitioner was Hannah Alexander, wife of George Fisher, who sought to have the marriage of her daughter by her first marriage, Violet Jeffs, set aside on the main ground that she was a minor when she married at Ottawa on April 3, 1919, a returned soldier named Angus Gordon. Petitioner said she did not consent to the marriage. Moreover, her daughter was a Catholic and the ceremony took place before a non-Catholic clergyman. There was no appearance of either parties to the marriage, and judgment was formally rendered by Mr. Justice Coderre granting the petition.

By her marriage to Lieut-Colonel Hawes in Paris, Millicent Duchess of Sutherland equalled the thrice-wedded record of her immediate predecessor in the title, Mary Duchess of Sutherland. "Mary Duchess" was the duchess who went to prison for contempt of court. She destroyed some document vital to a suit in which she was concerned. One of her marriages contained many of the ingredients of a novel. Her first husband, Mr. Blair, was accidentally shot by the Duke of Sutherland, who became her second husband. Her third husband was Sir Albert Kaye Rolitt, but they parted soon.

Impossible to Predict Events in Russia

MONTREAL, Dec. 2.—"It is very difficult, indeed almost impossible, to say what is going to happen in Russia," declared Dr. E. J. Dillon, the noted war correspondent who left Montreal tonight for Vancouver, en route to California. "I know, that some of the Bolsheviks are anxious that a considerable modification should be made in the aims and tactics of the present administration with a view to a coalition between all the Socialists in governments, but whether that is really feasible I am unable to say. I do know, however, that neither Denekine nor Kolchak would for a moment accept it, for both are men of great ideals who have the good of the country at heart, and have identified themselves with the anti-Bolshevik doctrine. To that extent they have become democrats and made concessions, but they refuse to have the country governed in the interests of any one class, and for that reason I do not believe any of the leaders would give his consent to such a coalition. I look upon the Bolshevik as

a disaster to the country, all the more as I am inclined to believe that the source of that movement is not Russian. To my mind it originated with the foreign element in the country." Answering a query as to how Europe is settling down Dr. Dillon said everything would depend upon what happened in Russia and Germany. "If the Germans are able to settle down and produce, then I think the outlook will be very much better economically whether the political results are another question, because I think if the Germans manage to regain their feet, they will take a large part in the re-organization of Russia. At the present moment, however, the Germans are very heavily handicapped by the conditions of the treaty. People sometimes express the fear that the Germans will dump their wares in various countries, but there is no real ground for that apprehension because the Germans are lacking raw material and transportation, and their exchange is at a frightfully low level; so that unless something is done by themselves or by outsiders to enable them to produce, they won't be able to do it, and the upshot will be financial disaster."

Discussing the attitude of the United States on the peace treaty Dr. Dillon said he himself did not believe that a partial league of Nations such as this would have any success whatever. The League of Nations must have a sanction, it must possess a super-national army in his opinion. He had been strongly in favor of any league of nations that would enable the peoples to settle their difficulties without war, and in the beginning had hoped that President Wilson would be able to attain that object; but if that were not feasible, then he had felt the only alternative was to make a peace treaty with Germany on the old lines, so that I do not believe at all in the League of Nations as it now stands. He added: "And I am entirely with those people in the United States who insist on reservations. The only modification I should make would be that they should not insist on three nations' accepting reservations, because it is simply a statement for the attitude of the United States to co-operate with them in the reconstruction of things and to assume responsibilities which are entirely counter to the doctrine of United States leaders, such as Monroe and even as far back as Washington."
