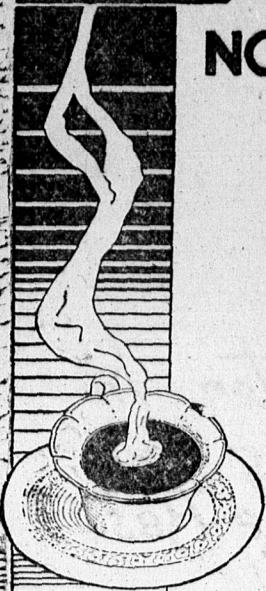

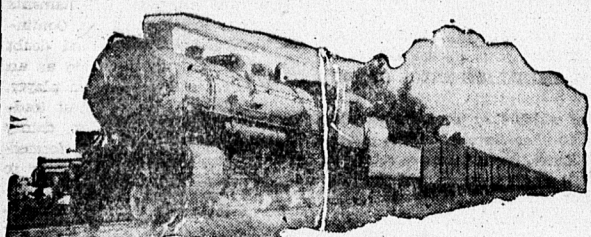

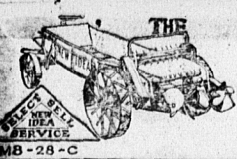

(Special to The Guardian) POINT DE CHENE, N.B., May 7.—The first shipment of live lobsters for the season left here today via the Canadian National Express for Boston. There were two carloads, Boston and New York are the principal markets for the live lobsters shipped from Point Du Chene, which is one of the largest lobster fishing centres in the Maritimes. The trade was a profitable one last year, considerable quantities being shipped and it is expected that this season will see a substantial increase.

War Veteran With Extra Set Kidneys Comes To Light

X-RAY REVEALED BREAK OF NATURE AFTER MAN HAD APPLIED FOR ADMISSION TO CLEVELAND, OHIO, HOSPITAL.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 7.—An extra set of kidneys has been discovered in Ralph Thurber, shell-shocked Great War veteran at the city hospital, where he gained admission after he told attendants he was suffering from distomiasis, a disease uncommon in this country. Hospital physicians said today that the X-ray located a normal pair of kidneys on his right side and another on his left. Double kidneys, the physicians said, are rare there having been only six previous cases on record here. On entering the hospital Therber told the attaches he had been a missionary in Korea and had contracted the disease there. It was found later he had not been a missionary and that he had a criminal record. Hospital attaches are now uncertain whether he had distomiasis.

King's Hold First Encaenia

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, N. S., May 7.—The first encaenia to be held in the new buildings of King's University was consummated today, as President, Dr. A. H. Moore outlined the contribution to education of the small residential college and emphasized the importance of research and of making a college "a place for the fresh thinking which results in new knowledge." At Chapel service previous to encaenia, very Rev. J. P. Lwyd, Dean of Nova Scotia, opened the text from Isaiah—"The little one shall become a thousand and the small one a strong nation"—to the development of Canada, and to the growth of education in the Dominion.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. DUNCAN COLE Another home at Fountain Road is saddened and another mound appears in the New London Cemetery. This time, the angel of death visited the home of Duncan Cole, on April 26th and removed from them, the wife and mother and when the mother is taken one loses one's best friend. She was only 58 years of age but an invalid for sixteen years and the last eleven years unable to walk and confined mostly to her bed, but bearing her long illness with a patience and a strength of character bespeaking her resignation to the divine will. Although an invalid for so long, yet her death came as a shock to friends and relatives. The funeral was held on Tuesday at 2 o'clock from the New London Church. A short service at the house and the remains were taken to the church. Both services were conducted by the Rev. Fred Williamson, of Malpeque. The Economic Situation

(Canadian Press Cable) LEEDS, England, May 7.—A world-wide conference to pool experiences and seek concerted remedies, was suggested by Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, Dominion Secretary, in an address here tonight. The conference was suggested as a means toward the solution of the present economic situation. Otherwise there was no hope for improvement until primary products like wheat, rubber and wool were stabilized, he said.

Successful Islander

The Regina Daily Star, in referring to the headquarters of the Pioneer firm of the Poole Construction Company, has the following to say of its Manager: E. E. Poole, A.M.E.I.C., chief organizer and president of the company bearing his name, has had an interesting and noteworthy career. Born on October 18, 1883, in Prince Edward Island, Mr. Poole received his early education in grade and high schools, followed by training at the Charlottetown Business College, these being supplemented with correspondence school course in architecture and engineering. Coming to Regina in 1904, Mr. Poole acted as superintendent for James Martin, builder, and in 1908 the two men became partners. Realizing the importance of the increased use of reinforced concrete, Mr. Poole furthered his knowledge of this field by taking a comprehensive study course covering this type of construction. This was but another demonstration of the ceaseless efforts made by him to keep abreast of the times, a spirit which he always possessed, and which he has instilled as a basic principle of the present company. Brought to the notice of the public through his beneficial service in construction, Mr. Poole became active in civic circles. He has been a member of the Rotary Club since its organization in Regina, and holds the rank of Honorary Lieut-Col. in the 12th Dist. Engineers. For the past two years he has served on the Board of Trade council in forwarding the growth and improvement of the city. A member of Emulation Lodge A. F. and A. M., Mr. Poole has taken an active interest in the Masonic Order, going through the various orders to join the Shrine in 1909. As a student of fine arts, Mr. Poole has made admirable collections of oil paintings, porcelains, Chinese bronzes and period furniture. An ardent golfer, he finds time as well to do much shooting and boating, and recently had built in Regina a 35-ft. power cruiser as well as several smaller boats for use at the lake, with the towered cottage built along Spanish lines set in a location of great natural beauty. In addition, Mr. Poole is a member of the Assiniboia Club, the Regina Golf Club, Antapa Shooting Club and the Saskatchewan Art Association.

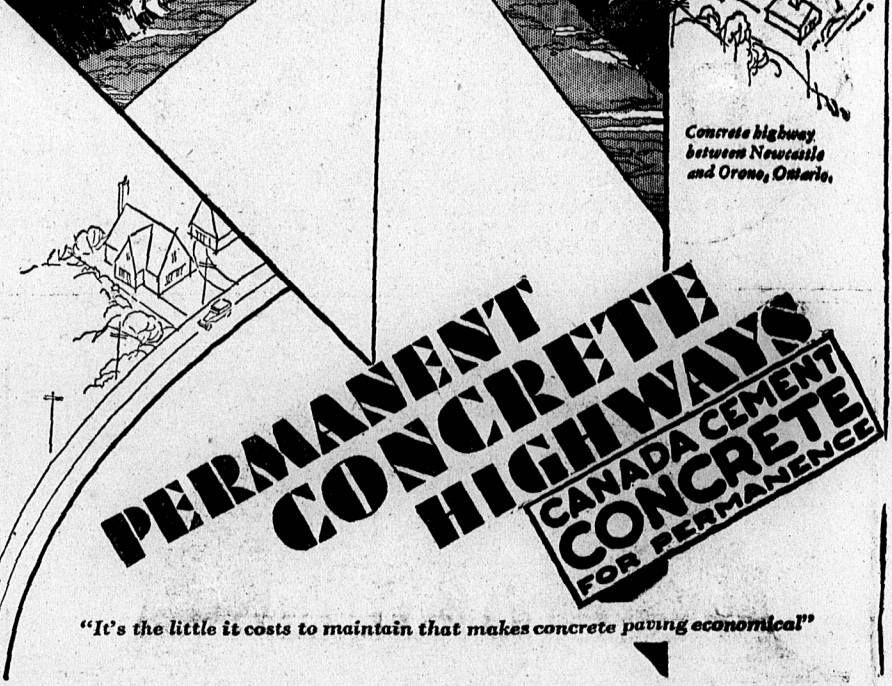
