The Annual Meeting of Bruce Stewart & Co. Limited, was held last evening in the Company's offices. There was a good attendance of shareholders present. Hon. Frank R. Hartz, the Vice President of the Company, occupied the chair. The Secty. Treas. C. L. MacKay, presented the Directors Report and Financial Statement, which showed a successful year's operations. He reported a considerable increase of business and larger profits over the previous year. On account of the very satisfactory condition of the Company the Directors declared a 6% Dividend on Capital invested. Appropriation For New Cruisers Is Sanctioned (Canadian Press) BERLIN, March 5.—The first appropriation for construction of new 10,000-ton armored cruisers was sanctioned today by the Reichstag Committee on ways and means. This first instalment will amount to \$2,500,000. The Committee vote, which followed a lengthy controversy on the floor of the Reichstag, was 15 to 12. Opposition came from the social democrats, the democrats, the communists and the Bavarian Peasant party.
