HOT IN NEW YORK.

NO REFUND ALLOWED.

HALIFAX, July 9—At the recent session of the Nova Scotia legislature a commission was appointed by the government to consider a claim from the counties of Antigonish, Guysboro and Pictou, for a refund of about \$70,000, without interest, paid by those municipalities for a right-of-way for the Eastern extension railway, afterwards a part of the line of the I. C. R. They claimed this refund from the Nova Scotia government. The commission, which was presided over by Chief Justice Fitzpatrick, of the supreme court of Canada, and of which the other members were Chief Justice Townsend, of Nova Scotia, and Mr. Justice Drysdale, sat at Ottawa.

HOT IN HALIFAX

HALIFAX, July 9—The thermometer yesterday as recorded officially, registered at 95.9 in the shade, the hottest in eight years. So far as known there were no prostrations, for despite the great heat there was constantly a westerly breeze.

FIRE NEAR HALIFAX.

HALIFAX, July 9—The old Lawson mill, a four-story structure, belonging to the Saragway club, about 250 yards from the club house, and almost directly across the road from the country house of F. B. McCurdy, M. P., was burned down last night in a spectacular blaze.

The place was once a grist mill and the water wheel went round in grinding wheat and oats for the countryside. This was long ago, but the wheel was still there, a romantic reminder of the past.

It was in this latter part that the fire broke out, no one knows how. When first seen the flames were up to the second story and in a few minutes the whole structure was enveloped in flames and soon was reduced to ashes.

The people nearby turned out well and did everything they could to prevent the spread of the fire to the woods. The house of Mr. McCurdy was in the greatest danger. Mr. and Mrs. McCurdy were absent, but the children were well cared for by the nurse and those at home. As a precaution of safety they were removed and the furniture was taken out. Before midnight it was seen, however, that there was no danger of a spread of the fire.

The men who thus ended their lives were: Ferdinand O. Baumann, head of the P. O. Baumann Manufacturing Company. David R. Anderson, president of the firm of Marvin, Smith & Co., stove manufacturers.

Mr. Baumann fired a bullet into his brain while in the bathroom of his residence. Mr. Baumann, who was 60 years old is believed to have ended his life in a fit of temporary insanity. His wife declared that during the last year she feared that he might take his own life owing to periods of depression and melancholy due to insomnia.

CHICAGO, July 8—Two presidents of Chicago business concerns committed suicide by shooting yesterday in their respective residences, and in each instance self destruction was prompted by mental depression, due in the one instance to ill health resulting from worry over financial troubles, and in the other chronic insomnia.

Constant worry and resultant ill-health due to financial difficulties are believed to have caused him to end his life. He is survived by a widow and a son 18 years old.
