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THREE MILLION DOLLAR BORROWING BILL RAILROADED THROUGH THE LEGISLATURE

Prohibition Act Gutted To Vest Political Control In Atty General Campbell

Independent Commission Gets The "Sack" And Mr. Campbell Gets \$500 Salary Boost. One Lone Liberal Voice Raised To Champion Prohibition Interests

The bulwark of the Prohibition law—the provision taking the administration of the Act out of the hands of politicians and vesting it in an independent Board of Commissioners—was removed at one fell swoop in the Legislature by the Lea Government yesterday.

The lethal operation took but a few minutes, discussion in committee being confined to but four of the thirty Liberal stalwarts elected last July.

Legislative Jobs Picked Clean By Liberal Members

Election Act Amended To Enable Members To Fill Salaried Jobs Of Law Clerk And Legislative Assembly Clerk, Also To Provide Pickings For Non-portfolio Members Of Treasury Board.

Overriding objections of its own party followers in the House, the Lea Government yesterday put through radical amendments to the Election Act dealing with the clause safeguarding the independence of parliament.

"Are there any other lawyers that are not fixed up?" taunted Mr. W. H. Dennis, veteran Liberal member for Second Prince, who ridiculed the bill as a dodge of his legal colleagues and denounced the inconsistency of firing purchasing agents as an "economy" measure and then hiring Treasury Board members to do their work.

REPUDIATES HIS PARTY'S CAMPAIGN

Premier Lea Not Concerned With Followers' Predicament Over Broken Pre-election Promises.

Reminded in the Legislature yesterday by Mr. Dennis (Liberal member for Second Prince) of the election promises made by Liberal candidates to abolish the portfolio of Public Health, Premier Lea sharply retorted that such a pledge was not in the Liberal platform and therefore was not binding on the Government.

The incident arose in the Legislature while the House, composed of thirty Liberal stalwarts, was in committee on an Act to amend the Education and Public Health Act, with Mr. W. F. Allan Stewart in the chair.

Hon. Mr. Campbell explained that the Health and Education Act, passed in 1930, provided that there should be a "Minister of Education and Public Health. Under certain circumstances this limitation prevented the smoothest and most efficient operation of the two departments. The bill proposed to divide the portfolios. The Government contemplated the Public Health portfolio being attached to another portfolio without additional remuneration and the department administered by the Public Health Officer who would have the title of Deputy Minister, but who would not receive additional remuneration.

MR. DENNIS' SCRUPLES Mr. Dennis (Second Prince) recalled that during the provincial election campaign the assurance was given by Liberal candidates that if elected, they would dispense altogether with the Public Health portfolio. "Have we been under a misapprehension?" he asked. "It

80 DEATHS IN TYPHOON (A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TOKYO, Sept. 26.—(Thursday)—Japan counted a death toll of 80 today as the tail of a typhoon threshed northward. It caused 32 deaths in Niigata, Yamaguchi and Gumma Prefectures, northwest and north of Tokyo. Most of the deaths were by drowning, the area receiving the heaviest downpour in 30 years. Troops were called out in Yamaguchi Prefecture for rescue and police work.

Cox And Dennis Vainly Protest Unprecedented Borrowing Authority Seized By Lea Government On Plea Of Reissuing Bonds At Indefinite Date And Refunding Overdraft Of An Unascertained Amount.

Legislative authority for the borrowing of three million dollars—the largest borrowing bill ever introduced in a Prince Edward Island Legislature—was taken yesterday by the Lea Government at a special session at which the measure, along with three other important pieces of legislation, was given first, second and third reading and assent of the Lieutenant Governor in the short space of a few hours.

Only two of the thirty Liberal legislative members—Messrs. W. H. Dennis and H. H. Cox, ventured to protest. The majority had nothing to say one way or the other, their silence passing for consent.

The bill is entitled "an Act to provide for the issue of debentures to pay off bank overdraft and to provide payment for permanent public works and to refund present debentures." It was moved into committee by Premier Lea, with Mr. St. Clair Trainor in the chair.

Section 1 of the bill provides: "It shall be lawful for the Province of Prince Edward Island to issue debentures in such form and manner as may be deemed proper for the purposes of raising the sum of Three Million Dollars or any part thereof for the purposes aforesaid; all such debentures to run for a period not exceeding thirty years and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed four per cent per annum, payable half yearly."

Premier Lea said the overdraft in the Bank of Montreal was drawing a high rate of interest and it was the intention to obtain a reduction by bond issue. A few days ago the Government had issued \$200,000 bonds, which was all it had authority to deal with. The interest rate received was much more favorable than was anticipated. The bonds, which were for ten years, sold at 99.58. "It is principally because we have not legislative authority to borrow any greater sum," he added, "that we have called this special session of the House. It is anticipated that through better economic conditions the market has reached the lowest point in bond interest rates and before we meet next March the interest rates may be considerably

(Continued on Page 9) SANCTIONS LOOM NEARER IN DISPUTE (C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) Italy yesterday cancelled the sailing of 10,000 soldiers to Libya, owing to lessened tension between Italy and Great Britain. Meanwhile Ethiopia's Emperor sent a commission to the African Kingdom to study Italian charges of aggressive acts. Reports that a general mobilization had been ordered were denied officially in Addis Ababa. The League Council prepared to meet today in Geneva for the next move in the international quarrel. It was expected to appoint another committee to prepare a report on the case. It was officially stated in Rome that Italy will never take the first step to transform the Italo-Ethiopian dispute into a European one. Italians at Geneva were scornful of Ethiopia's plea for dispatch of a commission to Africa. In London, a program for concentrating the Mediterranean Fleet in Greek waters was disclosed. The Admiralty took steps to rebuild the depleted Home Fleet.

A story appearing in a London weekly that Prince Umberto, heir to the Italian throne, was opposed to Premier Mussolini's quarrel with Ethiopia was reprinted by Paris newspapers. Boom In Newspaper Industry

OTAWA, Sept. 25.—The Dominion Bureau of Statistics today issued a report showing production in the pulp and paper industry in 1934 reached the highest point in three years. Total production at \$152,647,756 compared with \$123,415,492 in 1933 represented an increase of 23.39 per cent while net production of \$99,221,222 compared with \$76,782,971 in 1933, up 30.39 per cent. Exports of paper and paper goods during 1934 were valued at \$87,206,721 compared with \$72,396,132 the previous year. The Bureau said Canada's newsprint exports, estimated in 1934 at \$82,078,659 are second in value only to the nation's wheat exports and are greater than the newsprint exports of the rest of the world.
