BARON ACQUITTED IN FRENCH COURT

MELUN, FRANCE, Oct. 11, (Special)—The Criminal Court here has tried and acquitted on a charge of running over and killing a gypsy girl on August 8, Baron Hans von Bleichroeder and Walter Palmer, the chauffeur of Princess Sophia of Saxe-Weimar, who committed suicide at Heidelberg on September 9, owing to the refusal of her parents to consent to her marriage to Baron Bleichroeder.

The Princess, with her mother and the Baron, were in the automobile at the time of the accident. It was reported at the time of the Princess's suicide that she had killed herself because she feared a scandal as the result of her visit to France in company with a young man whom she had been forbidden to meet.

While she was in France she and the young man went on several long automobile drives in Fontainebleau Forest, and it was on one of these that the accident occurred. Every effort, it was said, had been made to hush up the affair owing to fear that the Princess's movements would become known to her father.

NEW ALBANY IS 100 YEARS OLD

NEW ALBANY, IND., Oct. 11.—New Albany will celebrate the centenary of its incorporation as a city by a gala week beginning tomorrow, on which the general plan for an old home week, but with more elaborateness. For a year the citizens have been preparing for the event, and their efforts promise now to result in one of the largest civic gatherings ever held in Indiana. The decorative features are especially attractive, street after street being bright with color. Pageants and festivities will be held each day and evening. Addresses will be delivered by Governor Ralston of Indiana, former Governor Wilson of Kentucky, former Vice President Fairbanks, former Governor Durbine of Indiana and United States Senators Kern and Shively.

TAFT SPEAKS AT ANDOVER
ANDOVER, MASS., Oct. 11.—The annual celebration of Founders' Day was brilliantly observed at Phillips Academy today. A feature of the programme was the dedication of a memorial tablet placed on the site of the first academy building, where Principal Elphinstone Pearson began his teaching in 1778. Former President William T. Taft and former Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson delivered the principal addresses.

IMPORT IRON ORE FROM FAR CHILE

NEW YORK, Oct. 11, (Special)—Five hundred million tons of high-grade iron ore in Chile are under lease to the Bethlehem Steel Company, and will be brought to Bethlehem at the rate of more than a million tons a year, beginning in 1915, by a fleet of vessels operating through the Panama Canal. Officers of the company so testified this afternoon at the hearing in the Government's dissolution suit against the United States Steel Corporation.

Charles A. Buck, vice-president of the company, said that the company would operate its own fleet of ore vessels. The ore will be laid down at Bethlehem, he said, cheaper than Lake Superior ore. It was the company's intention to operate almost exclusively on Chilean ore, if possible. A sixty-years' supply, he added, was in sight within twenty-five miles of the Chilean coast.

MAN BY PARCEL POST.

The introduction of the parcel post service in this country calls to mind a peculiar case that took place in England some time ago, and which, the Washington Star remarked, would occur oftener if the English people were informed concerning one of the parcel post regulations in that country. A gentleman wished to reach a customer living in a remote part of Balham, one of the suburbs of London, and it was very urgent that he find him quickly. Knowing nothing of the locality, he called at St. Martin le Grand to consult a clerk. Stating his case to a clerk, he was amazed to learn that he could be sent to the address by "parcel post" by paying a fee of three pence a mile. The gentleman had never heard of such a thing, and it is said that very few in England know that it can be done. Accepting the offer, the gentleman was placed in charge of a messenger familiar with all parts of the city, and was soon on his way. The boy carried a printed slip, on which was written a description of the "parcel" in charge, under the heading "Article required to be delivered," and before leaving the customer's house both the customer and the gentleman were required to place their signatures in the paper. The limit in weight for anything to be delivered by parcel post in England (as in this country) is generally understood to be eleven pounds, but there is one clause which reads: "A person may be conducted by express messenger to any address on payment of mileage fee."

NEW CHIEF OF ARMY ENGINEERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 11.—Brig. Gen. Dan G. Kingman today assumed the duties of chief of engineers of the army, succeeding Brig. Gen. William T. Rossell, who was transferred to the retired list on account of age. The new chief of engineers is a native of New Hampshire, and was graduated from West Point in 1875. He was in charge of the improvement of the Yellowstone National Park for some years and later superintended construction work on the Mississippi and the great lakes. For the past seven years he has been in charge of the southeastern engineering district, with headquarters at Savannah.
