The funeral took place from his late residence, 17 Standish street, Thursday, Sept. 21, at 8.15 a. m. Requiem high mass at 9 a. m. at St. Leo's Church. Interment was at Holy Cross cemetery. The deceased had relatives in this province and Spokane, Washington. Sgt. Harry Westaway, Georgetown, who was one of the P. E. Island members of the victorious Canadian Composite Artillery Team which competed recently in England with other British and Colonial teams, was a passenger to Georgetown yesterday on the afternoon train. Sgt. Westaway remained over in Quebec for a few days with friends, and did not accompany the Charlottetown members of the team on their return. During his stay in Quebec Sgt. Westaway was presented with a beautiful inkstand by a number of his friends. He arrived in the city on Tuesday evening. Shareholders and customers of the Bank of Nova Scotia in this province will be interested in the following from an exchange: It is reported that negotiations are in progress looking to the absorption of the Metropolitan Bank by the Bank of Nova Scotia. It is said that the Metropolitan holders will be offered 250 for their stock, upon which a 10 per cent. dividend is being paid at the present time. The Nova Scotia is one of the strongest banks in America, while the Metropolitan has been rapidly coming to the front. The Metropolitan has a capital of \$1,000,000 and a reserve of \$1,250,000. An exchange, referring to the recent Fredericton races says: "The Fredericton Exhibition races commence today; Frank Patch is a prohibitive favorite in the 2.15 class. Owing to Thursday being election day, the races scheduled for that day have been postponed to Friday. The Fredericton Gleaser says: According to all accounts there were some hot times at Chatham during the racing, and Driver Robida's winnings with Winnie Wilkes, 2,184, have been held pending investigation of the mare. She is by Rowan Wilkes and was a winner at the meeting at Augusta last month. The winnings of Billy C., a Prince Edward Island trotter by Brazilian, that equalled the Maritime trotting record of 2.16 1/2 at Chatham were also held up, the eligibility of his entry being questioned. There was more or less feeling between the Robida and the Daines tables and it is said that Driver Robida offered to match Winnie Wilkes, 2,184, against Oswego Boy, 2,154, for \$500 or \$600 a side. He has Prince Louie in his stable and has been driving the Brazilian trotter since Driver Sharon was injured at Halifax.
