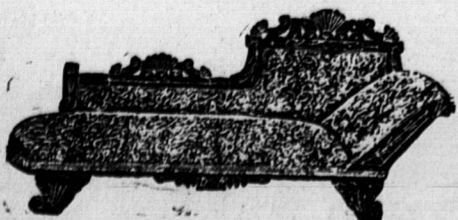

THE TARIFF COMMISSION.

The Tariff Commissioners have come and gone and representatives of our various producing and industrial interests have met them and had a hearing. All will agree that the members of the Commission gave a most courteous, intelligent and patient hearing to all who desired to be heard. With Hon. Mr. Fielding our people have come to be pretty well acquainted from his former visits to the Island, and their favorable impressions were increased during the present visit. Hon. Mr. Paterson and Hon. Mr. Brodeur, though something less prominent in Dominion affairs than the Finance Minister and less widely known here gave a distinct impression of being capable as well most courteous and genial public men with whom a closer acquaintance would gladly be made by any who chanced to meet them here for the first time.

In several respects it was a rather favorable feature that all our provincial representatives of leading Island interests met the Commissioners at one time and place. There was less of sectionalism and matters were viewed more generally from a provincial standpoint than in three or four meetings had been held in as many different parts of the Island. The Commissioners will also more readily form a just opinion of Island interests as affected by the tariff from hearing all the delegates at one place and time and in the presence of each other. The farming interest was well represented and the spokesman of our farmer presented the case of our greatest industry in a clear and forcible manner. The farmers dominated the meeting, as they were fairly entitled to. None the less there was a fair and effective presentation of our starch, tobacco and pork-packing industries.

The meeting proved a highly educative one and if it could have been attended by thousands they would have gathered a fund of information of great value. Tariff making is really a very complex and difficult matter and this fact must have impressed itself upon all who listened to the conversational discussion between the Ministers and the spokesmen for various interests. There were few dull moments throughout the busy day and an occasional quick repartee or touch of humor enlivened the inquiry often provoking both laughter and applause.

Congratulations to President Tidmarsh of the Board of Trade.

The Forestry Convention at Ottawa seems to be a great success in so far as the number of distinguished persons attending it is concerned. The representation embraces all the Canadian Provinces and at the same time so many of the States as to make it an international body. The Forestry Convention has also a most important mission to fill, justifying Sir Wilfrid's title of "a great Parliament."

The card of Councillor James Paton as candidate for the Mayoralty appears in another column of this issue. The largely signed requisition he has received gives assurance of general popular support. This Mr. Paton has deserved by his intelligent, prudent and progressive action during the years that he has served as Councillor for Ward Five and as Chairman of the Street Committee. In Mr. Paton's case the office seems to be seeking the man, which is a desirable condition of things.

SCOTT ACT REPEAL.

Voting for the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in Prince County will take place on Thursday, February 1, a date now near at hand. The voting will be by ballot, by electors qualified to vote for members of Parliament. The penalties for bribery, intimidation, corrupt practices and personation or repeating are similar to those in the election of members of Parliament. The hours for voting on polling day are the same—between 9 a. m. and 5 p. m.

In this case as the object of the temperance people is to repeal the Canada Temperance Act so far as Prince County is concerned, in order that the Provincial Prohibition Law may come into force in its stead, all who desire this change should mark the X in their ballots, under the words "Against the Act." They will thus be voting in the opposite way from what they hitherto voted when they desired to continue the Canada Temperance Act in force.

The friends of prohibition in Prince County will do well to be on the alert and take due precautions against a possible surprise on polling day. Trustworthy agents should be assigned to every poll and care be taken that from the opening to the close of the polling such agents are at their posts and on the watch. Special effort should be made to awaken public interest in order that all who want the liquor traffic abolished may go to the polls and vote.

The temperance organizations can do much in this way, and pastors and churches can render great service by impressing upon all the importance of recording their votes, and seeing that the polling is guarded against illegal voting and personation. One or two days time is not too much to give in order to bring into operation our Prohibition Law, which is the best of its kind extant. We shall return to the subject at an early day to show the advantages of the Provincial Law over the Temperance Act as an efficient means of suppressing the liquor traffic.

The Railroad Gazette tells that a Swiss life insurance company has agreed to insure members of a railway men's temperance society for four per cent less than the premiums charged to non-members; and a Swiss accident insurance company which for some time has made a rebate of ten per cent to total abstainers is so well satisfied with the result that it will make the rebate 15 per cent after 1905.

An interesting article from the pen of Rev. Dr. Wilson, St. John appeared in the Montreal Witness of the 6th inst under the caption, A Very Peculiar People. It refers to the late Rev. Donald Macdonald and those sharing his religious views and commonly called Macdonaldites. A vivid description is given of a religious service conducted by Rev. Mr. Macdonald years ago at which Rev. Dr. Wilson was present. The article is conceived more in an appreciative than a critical spirit, but the writer states that for the manifestations at the meeting as described by him he "can offer no intelligent reason."
