Amalgamation Rumors Denied By Mr. Meighen

COBALT, Ont., Aug. 6.—Premier Meighen yesterday visited the Nipissing Mine, and addressed a crowded hall at Cobalt. Hon. Charles McCrea, Minister of Mines for Ontario, urged co-operation between the Federal government and the government of Ontario for the development of the iron deposits of Ontario. "I assure Mr. McCrea," said Premier Meighen later, "that I have learned to take the deepest interest in Northern Ontario, and Northern Quebec, a more keen and more intimate interest than you perhaps know and he may rest certain that his government, and indeed, the government of Quebec, as well, will have the most sympathetic co-operation from us in any measure looking to the development of water power, of minerals, of agriculture, of anything upon which this north depends."

Ottawa, Aug. 6.—Belief that the Canadian National Railways will show an assured improvement in operating results this year over last, coupled with praise of the "tremendous improvement made last year, is contained in a statement issued by Sir Henry Drayton, Acting Prime Minister, in the new government. Sir Henry declared that the "Conservative party is in some way or other going to get rid of the National Railways, in some way or other is going to hand them over, presumably to the Canadian Pacific."

Sir Henry's Statement

Sir Henry Drayton's statement follows: "My attention has just been called to the fact that the Toronto Star is making prophesies as to what I intend doing after the election and is slating me for high office. "I wish I could look upon the Toronto Star's interest in my welfare as personal to me, but I am afraid that such is not the case. During the last election this paper tried to make me out of the suggestion that the Conservative party was in some way or other going to get rid of the National Railways, and in some way or other hand them over, presumably to the Canadian Pacific. There was, of course, nothing in its rumor of that date; there is absolutely nothing in the Star's prophecy of today, under which Sir Henry is to replace either Sir Henry Thornton or the Hon. P. C. Larkin. This news indeed, is news to me; but is no news at all, made merely for the purposes of the election.

Tremendous Improvement. "Anything that is written, which in any way disturbs the administration of the country's greatest undertaking, is particularly mischievous. The president of a large system, such as ours, represents much more than himself; he represents the organization which he has built up and through which he functions. There have been differences of opinion in the past as to the railway management, but, as I have before said, there can be no difference of opinion as to the tremendous improvement made last year—the impressive economies brought about in transportation. Poisoned Alcohol Sneaked From U. S.

LIQUOR HIDDEN UNDER LOADS OF COKE AND COAL, SAYS PETER WHITE

TORONTO, Aug. 7.—Peter White, K. C., special prosecutor appointed by the federal government to deal with the smuggling side of the poison alcohol probe which is continued by the Dominion and Provincial authorities, stated today that he had no doubt that the poison alcohol came across the international border hidden under loads of coke and coal by a coal company located in Niagara Falls, N. Y. "There were false order numbers on the invoices, and the orders were not made by the people whose names were on the invoices, nor were the loads delivered to these people. They were delivered instead to the resort of a notorious bootlegger," Mr. White said.

Turks Close All Foreign Chambers

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 7.—Despatches from Ankara, the Turkish capital say the government has ordered the closing of all foreign chambers of commerce in the country. The order is said to be directed particularly at the British, United States, French and Italian chambers.
