

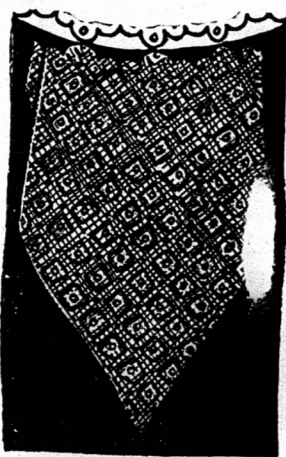

Establishment of Imperial Currency

OTTAWA, June 17—(By The Canadian Press)—Establishment of an Imperial currency as the cornerstone of the economic structure which it was hoped would be created at the Imperial Conference to meet in Ottawa was suggested by General A. D. McRae.

Approached on the subject of currency, Senator McRae thought that an imperial currency, backed up by the present gold reserves and the future gold production of the British Empire, was certain to carry with it immediately the position of leadership as a world exchange.

"There is a substantial body of Canadian opinion," Senator McRae said, "disposed to regard the necessary cornerstone of the economic structure, which it is hoped the coming Imperial Economic Conference will create, to be the establishment of a system of Imperial Currency, guaranteed by Great Britain and each Dominion participating in the same."

"It is freely predicted by competent economists in the United States that the United States is certain to go off the gold standard within the next 12 months and possibly much sooner if the present rate of decrease in their gold reserves continue and it is noted that their reserve on June 1 of 61.4 per cent. was at the lowest point for this year and was nine and one-half per cent. less than two months ago."

General McRae was of the opinion that it would be advisable in establishing a currency to adopt the decimal system, thus making it readily intelligible and adjustable to the monies of the different world nations. As a unit of value, the guinea might be resurrected and have it represent the equivalent of five dollars in gold.

"In order to accomplish these objectives," Senator McRae stated, "it is suggested that at the Economic conference Great Britain and the Dominions agree to establish an imperial bank or an imperial governing board, behind which will be placed the present gold reserves in Great Britain and the Dominions, aggregating at the present time some nine million dollars."

"The Empire's increasing gold production should not be overlooked. In this Canada will play an important part. Canada's gold production in 1930 was \$42,041,000, in 1931 it increased to \$53,394,000. The estimated production for 1932 is \$60,000,000 with a prospect of \$100,000,000 annual production five years hence."

Referring to the payment of foreign obligations in gold, general McRae remarked that the establishment of this imperial currency "will enable us to pay our obligations to the United States without discount for it can be safely assumed that the imperial currency will be on a par with gold, possibly a slight premium."

NEW YORK, June 16—Mrs. Marie Peary Stafford, daughter of the late Admiral Robert E. Peary, the Arctic explorer, sailed tonight on the auxiliary schooner Effie Morrissey for Cape York, North Greenland. She goes to supervise the construction of a monument to the memory of her father, who discovered the North Pole in 1909.

The Morrissey is expected to reach Cape York about July 3. Included in the 70 tons of supplies aboard the boat are tons of cement to be used in building the monument. Mrs. Stafford, born in the Arctic has been known for many years as the "snow baby." Her two sons, Peary, 12, and William, 10, are also making the trips.
