Charlottetown had its first strike in several years yesterday when 30 employees of the Island Fertilizer Company walked out at noon.

The men asked that the 35-cent hourly wage, which they have been earning, be increased to 40 cents. The firm refused to meet this demand and the plant was idle yesterday afternoon.

The strike comes at the plant's busiest season as farmers are preparing to purchase their annual supply of fertilizer. Up until the present, the men were working on an eight-hour day but within a few days would be working overtime. Fifty cents an hour would be paid for overtime.

International At A Glance

LONDON — Prime Minister Churchill gains 447-3 vote of confidence in House of Commons; pledges Britain to "fight to death" to hold Mediterranean positions and expresses expectation of increased United States aid; David Lloyd-George argues "America can do more" and must if Britain is to win.

CAIRO — Iraq forces routed from Habbaniyah airbase with heavy losses which Mr. Churchill says total 1,000; British control of oil pipeline station at Rutba regained; "revolt" attributed to pro-German intrigues in Iraq by Mr. Churchill who warns Germany yet may intervene in Iraq.

CAIRO — So. African troops strike at last Italian positions left in northern and northern Ethiopia; sand storms and intense heat limit action to skirmishing at Tobruk and Salm in North Africa.

LONDON — R.A.F. downs 25th German plane in 24 hours; German long-range guns briefly shell Dover area, killing two women, wounding 12 persons.

VICHY — Vichy wins 25 per cent reduction in upkeep of German occupation forces; what French gave Germans, if anything, in return is not announced; German Vichy negotiations continue in Paris.
