

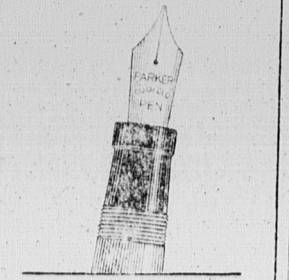
Charlottetown Hotel Company, Ltd. ANNUAL MEETING NOTICE
