THE proposed dairy school in Charlottetown will be conducted on rather different lines from the work at the regular dairy schools, it being only a temporary arrangement for the specific purpose of giving instruction in cheese making and milk testing for probably two weeks. Mr. J. A. Raddick, Chief Dairying Service Division, will probably be in attendance for a part of the time and Mr. J. W. Mitchell, who is superintendent for the department in Nova Scotia, will be present during the whole course. Mr. Mitchell is eminently qualified to take charge of work of this kind, having had a long experience as a practical cheesemaker, and filled the position of instructor at the Guelph Dairy School for several years.

THE most interesting foot ball game of the season was played on Saturday, Nov. 16, between the Dalhousie Senior team and Army team. Shortly after the game began the Dalhousie boys secured a try but failed to convert it into a goal. Although the game was hotly contested no more scoring was done in the first half and when half time was called, the score stood 3-0 in favor of Dalhousie. In the second half the Army team started out with a determination to win. After some little time they secured a try and succeeded in converting it into a goal. No more scoring was done on either side and at the close the score stood 5-3 in favor of the Army. This is Dalhousie's first defeat and another game will have to be played to decide the fate of the trophy.

A SYDNEY despatch of November 19th says: A branch of the Lord's Day Alliance was organized in this town last night by the Rev. J. G. Shearer, of Toronto, organizing secretary of the Alliance. Mr. Shearer set forth the object and ideals of the Alliance at a mass meeting held at the Methodist church on Sunday night. It is thought that the Alliance will become a strong factor in keeping down the present day tendency towards the desecration of the Sabbath. This tendency is of late becoming noticeable in Cape Breton where the coal and other companies are anxious to have their chartered steamer loaded on Sunday as well as through the week. It will be remembered that Mr. Shearer organized a branch of the Lord's Day Alliance in Charlottetown last year.

Chester, the camping ground of Julius Agricola over eighteen hundred years ago, Hawarden and Eaton Hall, the homes of the late Wm. E. Gladstone and the Duke of Westminster respectively, Shrewsbury with its famous battlefield and church, Stratford upon Avon, the home of the immortal Shakespeare, Warwick and Kenilworth with the grand old castles celebrated in song and story, Oxford, the city of colleges and advanced seats of learning, Windsor with its beautiful castle and parks and "The Review of the Household Brigade" by the late Queen Victoria at which Mr. Smith was present, were beautifully illustrated and described at length, making in all a most interesting and instructive lecture. Mr. J. A. Campbell was chairman and a most cordial vote of thanks was tendered the Rev. lecturer and the meeting closed by singing the National Anthem.

IN referring to the placing of the Stanley on the Summerside Cape Tormentine route the Sackville Post says: People living in this end of the country will be pleased to learn that this route is at last to be given a fair trial. The Summerside people and those living in the western part of the Island have for years been urging the government to test this route thoroughly but for different reasons many of them very childish, nothing was ever done until last winter, when the Stanley was started here, but was almost immediately withdrawn, because of the outbreak of smallpox in the parish of Botford. Many of the Island people have long contended that the steamer Stanley if placed on this route would serve the whole Island much more satisfactorily than she has ever done on the Pictou route. They have pointed out that frequently when the Pictou route was full of ice and the vessel was having the greatest difficulty in making her trips, the Cape route was practically free of ice and the Stanley if running here would have had no difficulty whatever. But for some reason the change was never made, although Sir Louis Davies, when minister of marine promised to give the Cape route a fair trial. We believe that, with the exception of a month or perhaps six weeks in the middle or toward the end of the winter the Stanley will be able to keep up an uninterrupted communication here between the Island and the mainland. The mails it will be seen will be delivered much more regularly if a satisfactory arrangement is made with the N. B. & P. E. I. people to carry them from Sackville to the Cape. The steamer running in conjunction with the N. B. & P. E. I. train, both passengers and mails should be delivered with the utmost promptness and dispatch.
