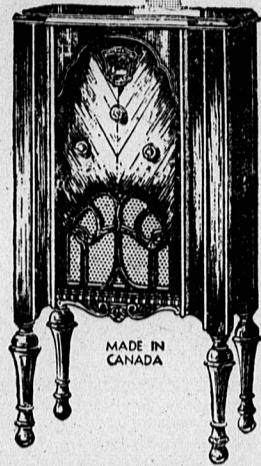

HATE, FEAR, WORRY AND ALSO JEALOUSY HALT A MAN'S SPAN OF LIFE AT THE AGE OF FIFTY-EIGHT.

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—The way that hate, fear, worry, and jealousy have helped to choke off at 53 years man's hitherto rapidly increasing span of life was described to the American College of Surgeons last night.

The bank president worrying over business, the criminal suddenly stricken with fear and the mother watching her sick child, all were pictured as doing the same injury

to their health. This increase to fifty eight as the average time every adult may expect to live was discussed by two internationally known physicians, Dr. George M. Crile, of the Cleveland Clinic, and Dr. Charles H. Mayo, of the Mayo Clinic of Rochester, Minn.

Dr. Crile told the medical story of ravages of emotions of modern civilization. Dr. Mayo sketched remedies for ill health, which included newspapers as "the greatest educating, thought molding enterprise in the world."

Both ascribed the recent in-

demics and world plagues of the past. Now, they said, comes a new and different phase, when the individual must learn how to aid in his own healing, guided by the doctor.

Bracken Complains Of Wasted Time

WINNIPEG, Oct. 19.—Charges that Col. F. G. Taylor, Provincial Conservative Leader, had thrown an expenditure burden of \$500,000 on Manitoba by his refusal to enter

a proposed Union Government and "endangered the province's credit" by his criticism of the Government's financial condition were laid by Premier Bracken in a fighting speech. "The next session of the Legislature would have lasted three weeks instead of three months if the other

parties had co-operated and we could have gone to work with a non-party administration that would have saved the province hundreds of thousands of dollars," he declared. Col. Taylor had answered "no" to the Union Government proposal, Mr. Bracken said. Only the Liberal Leader was willing to co-operate. The Labor leader would have considered the offer on condition that all social service expenditures were either maintained or increased.

"In common with all governments, we must retrench somewhat in all our services," the Premier mentioned. "We have every intention of continuing to care for our aged helpless, blind and the unemployed. But Labor must understand this government, intends that other services will be continued."
