\$2.00 fee on each of the first three children attending. Many parents of the three districts that withdrew, got their children to the consolidated school at their own expense and paid the \$5.00 fee besides the regular taxes to their own district school. And now at the end of another three years many parents are willing to pay the quadrupled assessment and get their children to the school at their own expense, thus eliminating the vans.

This surely looks well for the future of the school. It stands now presumably as a free gift to the community and the Province and the people may use it for the running. Let us "keep it up" and retain its teachers for Prince Edward Island. The West has good salaries awaiting them if they are not wanted at Hillsboro, and it would be only too glad to be presented with hundreds of such consolidated schools.

The problems of running such central schools will be lightened with the passing of the years. Last year forty of the sixty automobiles purchased in Prince Edward County, Ontario, were bought by farmers; and the day may come when they will be used for conveying pupils to the Hillsboro School. Perhaps the airship or rural trolley line will soon be practicable, and some may live to see each pupil fitted out with a pair of wings which will enable him to overcome all obstacles! By all means let us "keep it up!" In a few years it may be the Country Centre for a graduate of the Agricultural College as is now the case at twenty of the County High Schools in Ontario. Canada is advancing—Prince Edward Island must keep up her reputation for the production of well-trained sons and daughters to lead in solving the problems of a young and rapidly-growing nation.
