Supreme Court.

The Trinity term of the Supreme Court met here yesterday. On the bench were Hon. Chief Justice Sullivan, Mr. Justice Hodgson and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald.

The following composed the Grand Jury: P. Blake (foreman), Jas. Essory, Ewen McKinnon, Jas. H. Gregor, John McQuarrie, Joseph Power, John McQuaid, Roderick Munn, Frederick Morris, John Fraser, D. A. McLeod, John Murchison, Joseph Gallant, Wallace L. Rodd, Wm. Henry Inman, S. C. Clark, Albert Craig, Chas. Kelly, Jas. Shaw, Jas. McMillan, Geo. S. McLeod, A. W. Holroyd, Thos. Crane, Benj. Heartz.

In his address to the Grand Jury the Chief Justice commented strongly upon the manner the Queen's County jail is conducted. He characterized it as mismanagement when a party committed for trial is allowed to suicide. He referred to the escape of Gormley and contended that the loose management of the Jail was not the way a public institution should be managed. Prisoners are brought before the Court, sentenced and allowed to laugh at justice after putting the county to the expense of their trial. He contended that the way the Jail is being conducted is a discredit to the county. He referred to the beneficial effect in regard to the same trouble in Summerside when the Grand Jury looked into the matter, and hoped the same would be the result when the Grand Jury made a full enquiry and reports who in their opinion is responsible, the Jailor or the Government.

The Attorney-General intimated that the Jailor was a new man, whose appointment was necessary by reason of the ill health of his predecessor. As Attorney-General he had instructed the Jailor to take all precaution possible.

One of the jurymen failing to be present and giving no excuse, a summons was issued.

An application was made for Duncan E. Shaw, Brackley Point, to study law in the office of the Attorney General. The usual order for an examination was granted.

The following are the findings of the Grand Jury: The King vs. Mrs. Gormley on a charge of house breaking and larceny. No bill.

The King vs. John McFadyre on a charge of house breaking and larceny. True bill.

The King vs. Alfred Gallant and John Gallant on a charge of assault occasioning bodily harm. True bill.

In the afternoon the Grand Jury visited the Jail and investigated the cause of the recent suicide and escape. They will visit the Asylum to-day.

REV. D. W. LELACHEUR.

No Particulars of His Death Received in Portland.

The Portland Argus of June 21st contained the following sketch of Rev. D. W. Lelacheur, formerly pastor of the Foss Street Methodist Church, whose death was reported in the Record last evening: Mrs. D. W. Lelacheur, wife of the Rev. D. W. Lelacheur, formerly pastor of the Vaughan street church of this city, but of late connected with the Christian Alliance Missionary Society, received a cablegram on Monday announcing the death of her husband.

Rev. Mr. Lelacheur left this city on the eighth day of last October on a visit to the different associations throughout the world. He visited China, India, the Philippines, Palestine and had just reached Freedom, Africa, from whence came the news of his death. He was the general superintendent of the field work of the Christian Missionary Alliance in which work he has been interested since he gave up his parish here about 10 years ago. He has travelled extensively during that time, having passed over the route on which he was travelling when death came several times.

The cause of his death is unknown to his family and friends and it will probably be a month before full particulars can be obtained. The last letter received from him by Mrs. Lelacheur was from Port Said, Egypt, when he reported his health to have been very good.

Rev. Mr. Lelacheur came to this city about 20 years ago, having been assigned to take charge of the Pine Street M. E. church. He remained as pastor of this church for a time when owing to some personal difficulties, he withdrew and with the aid of several laymen established the Vaughan street church, over which he retained the pastorate for some time. During that time he became interested in the Christian Alliance work and his entire time during the last nine years has been given to that.

The Rev. A. B. Simpson, who during the summer months visits Old Orchard, is a worker in the Christian Alliance cause and like Rev. Mr. Lelacheur is an officer in the society, which is non-sectarian and embraces, among its members many Portland people.

Rev. Mr. Lelacheur was 59 years old last December and since he was 18 years old has been engaged in Christian work. He leaves besides a widow, one married daughter, who lives with her mother at No. 4 Gilman street, this city. One son, Lewis W. Lelacheur, was killed some years ago, while at his work as a freight conductor on the Maine Central.

The Mr. Lelacheur mentioned above was a native of Murray Harbor, where many of his relatives now reside, including Mr. Charles Lelacheur of Guernsey Cove and Mr. James Lelacheur of Murray Harbor South.

The angel of death visited the settlement of North Wiltshire on Sunday evening, June 23rd claiming as its victim, Margaret McCann, beloved wife of George Clow in 80th year of her age, who had suffered with a lingering illness during the past four years which was borne with a Christian resignation in Him who doeth all things well. The sad news quickly spread over our beautiful village filling the homes of relatives and friends with sorrow and sadness. The late Mrs. Clow leaves ten children and a loving husband, who was constantly at her side in sickness besides a host of friends to mourn the loss of a kind mother and benevolent neighbor. Of the surviving children, Artemas the youngest with his family reside at North Wiltshire, the other nine George, Charles, Lenauel, Ambrose, Ephraim, Mrs. McDowall, Mrs. Munroe and Mrs. Cameron reside in Minnesota, U. S. to which place they emigrated from North Wiltshire in the early eighties, and where they have provided for themselves comfortable homes and circumstances. Another daughter Mrs. Ashely resides in Tacoma, Washington, U. S. The remains of the deceased lady were interred in the Methodist burial grounds at North Wiltshire on Tuesday 25th inst, and were followed to their last resting place by a large concourse of people, showing the respect and esteem in which she was held by the community, in which she was so long and favorably known. In the absence of the family Pastor the funeral services at Church and home were conducted by the Rev. George Millar of Brookfield in a manner suitable to the sad occasion. The late Mrs. Clow's memory will ever be held in high esteem and cherished by people of this and the adjacent districts for her acts of charity and Christian character, she having also been a consistent member of the Methodist Church of this place during the last half century. She died trusting in the merits of her Redeemer and looking towards the glorious resurrection of those that put their trust in Him.

Severe Outbreak of Typhoid Fever.

LATEST FROM SOUTH AFRICA.

LONDON, June 25.—(Special.)—In the Commons to-day the announcement was made that the war continues to cost \$1,250,000 weekly and that the invaders of Cape Colony number from one to two thousand. TYPHOID IS PREVALENT.
