SPELTZ, before referred to in THE GUARDIAN, is a new grain, described as a combination of wheat, rye and barley, is said to yield from 80 to 100 bushels to the acre and is well adapted to our Island soil and climate. It has been grown for centuries past in Southern Russia. It is claimed to be ahead of corn, superior to oats and more profitable than wheat. It is as easily cultivated as oats or barley. It will grow in poor soil and is not injured by drought. The straw is like that of wheat. Mr. John Newson has imported and has for sale a limited quantity. One to one and a quarter bushels will seed an acre. Our farmers ought to try it.

THERE will be a Sunday School convention in Zion church on Tuesday April 10th. The first session will be at 3 p. m. and will be devoted mainly to the consideration of primary work. Rev. J. M. Young will give an address outlining the object and work of a primary union, and Miss Wathen will teach the S.S. Lesson to a Primary class.
