PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE NOTES.—There was a large congregation present at St. Matthew's Church on the evening of Wednesday April 27th, the occasion being the closing exercises in connection with the Presbyterian College and the conferring of degrees on the graduating students. Rev. Principal Pollok presided. Addresses were given by the Principal and by Rev. Dr. Somerville of Glasgow, Scotland. There were only four graduates. These were: J. A. Bradley, Clifton, N. S.; L. B. Gibson, Ireland; Wm. McDonald, Sunny Brae, N. S. and F. S. Douce, Folly Village, N. S. Mr. Bradley will settle in Grant F. H., N. B.; Mr. Gibson, Glassville, N. B.; Mr. McDonald Bloomfield P. E. I.; and Mr. Vance, New Aberdeen, Cape Breton.—Rev. D. H. McKinnon of North West Arm, Halifax and Rev. E. H. Ramsay of Metapedia, N. B. received the degree of B. D. the latter with high distinction.—The degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred on Rev. E. D. Millar, Yarmouth, N. S.; Rev. A. F. Carr, Campbellton, N. B.; Rev. E. Smith, Musquodoboit, N. S.; Rev. Thos. Cumming, Scotsburn, N. S.; and Rev. R. T. Somerville, Glasgow, Scotland.—On Thursday morning the College Board held their regular meeting. Rev. Principal Pollok's resignation was accepted. Rev. Dr. R. A. Falconer was appointed Principal and Rev. A. S. Morton, St. Stephen, N. B. was nominated as Professor of Practical Theology and Church History. Mr. Morton's present appointment is for the term of three years at the sum of \$1500 per annum. Mr. Morton is a son of Rev. Dr. Morton of Trinidad. He is a clever young man and the college is very fortunate in obtaining his services as Professor in the subjects formerly taught by Dr. Pollok.—Under the instruction of such men as Dr. Falconer, Dr. Magill, Dr. Currie and Rev. A. S. Morton, there is no doubt but that our young men for the ministry can get a better training than in any of the other theological colleges of Canada. Then let not our young men of the Maritime Provinces go further away than Halifax and fare worse.—The 1-1-10 students in Dalhousie and Pine Hill who are laboring as catechists have been appointed to the following mission fields for the summer: R. H. Stavert, Ingram River, Halifax Co., N. S.; W. H. Toombs, Hantsport, N. S.; W. I. Green, Baxter's Harbor, N. S.; C. G. Townsend, Pictou Island; W. H. Sweet, Riley Brook, N. B.; Mr. Stavert was first appointed to labor at Shediac, but on account of the great need of an experienced student to open up a new field at Ingram River, Mr. Stavert was strongly requested to give up the former and undertake the work in the new field. The location of the new field is a pleasant one and the work will be interesting and not at all heavy. The field is about twenty five miles from Halifax and fronts on the beautiful waters of St. Margaret's Bay.
