He has shipped about 7,000 live geese this season approximately the same quantity as his firm, C. W. Austin and Co. Boston, has received from here for the past 27 years. Some differences in conditions however have arisen. In the early days of the firm's business here, geese were bought for fifty cents each; this season they were bought for \$1.75 to \$2.00. Mr. Austin expressed himself as delighted with the business done this year, particularly with the excellent service rendered by the Prince Edward Island Railway and its officials, from the Supt. station agents and trainmen of all ranks whom he found most obliging and courteous. Many cars of live geese were shipped in every instance the utmost satisfaction resulted.

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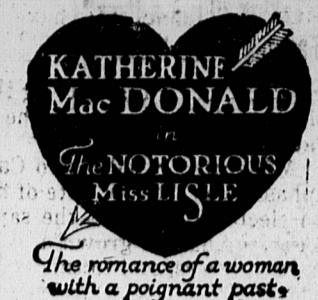
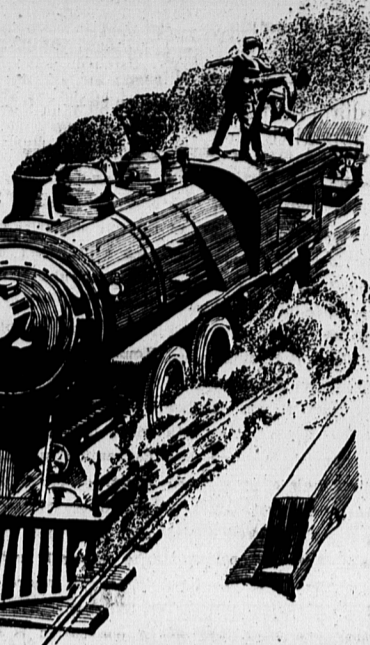

business profit taxes, income taxes and sales taxes were put on in order to raise the money necessary.

where was Mr. King and Mr. Crerar when these measures were brought in, legislated upon, carried by the approval of both Houses and placed on the statute books? They were in Parliament. They were supporters of the legislation. They approved of those methods of taxation and compliance that the government for moving out in the way of direct taxation rather than getting everything from the people in the way of indirect taxation. This, then, is not also a settled question. They are great questions—the immensity of our debt and how taxation should be raised—but they are settled questions. All the talk of Mr. King and Mr. Crerar will not disturb them one single bit.

The speaker then took up the subjects of protective tariff and dealt with it ably and completely. The Liberal platform of 1919 embraces Free Trade and Mr. King, if elected, can, as an honorable man, do only one thing—carry that platform out. He had hoped to gull the farmers of the west with a tariff policy similar to their own. He went with his platform in his hand to the voters. "Why should farmers fall out by the way?" he said, "Others fight in under the Liberal umbrella and we will march in out of the storm together!" (Laughter.) But the farmers told him to run along. "We don't want you to bother us the least little bit."

Now he would give twenty-five years of his life if he could undo that little piece of strategy he concocted in the hot days of June and July, 1919.

"I want to ask you to come to this conclusion," continued Sir George. "That there is a very grave responsibility devolving upon electors in Canada in this election. It is not the ordinary election by any means. Canada's situation is one of immense difficulties, financial and otherwise. I do not envy the Prime Minister and the Cabinet which takes up the administration of affairs at Ottawa for the next five years. I am not one of those who think we are falling to ruin or anything like that, but I think it does require the sanest and soundest government to carry us through successfully. We have three young men at the heads of our political parties. I have had quite an experience under Premiers myself and I know that a Premier is not worth his salt unless he is able to lead and dominate his cabinet. To the Prime Minister falls the decision of every question and if he lacks the power of decision the government is doomed from the start. Do the farmers,

of the country realize what troubles they are courting when they want the reins of government? They do not and cannot know! Only the men who have gone through the grill of the last eight or nine years of government have got to know something about it.

"I would rather that you put him in with a majority at his back to actually carry on a government than that you should let it come to pass that three groups, about equal, with different views and lines of policy, should come together to log-roll and haggle and quibble in an endeavor to carry on government."

The speaker concluded, amid applause, with an eloquent appeal to his hearers to weigh carefully the record of Premier Meighen and his colleagues as against the record of his opponents. What Canada wants is a stable government, captained and directed by experienced men. It is for the voters to determine which of the three parties has the experience required. Let them study the question with an honest determination not to be led astray by prejudice or misrepresentation.

The speaker had every confidence that their decision would be the best for Canada as a whole. With a strong hand at the helm there is nothing brighter than the future of our great Canadian land. (Applause.)

The meeting adjourned with the singing of the National Anthem.
