S'side Celebrates 60th Anniversary

Excellent Program, Which Included Display Of Fireworks And Street Dancing, Carried Out—Horse Racing And Other Sports In Afternoon.

Yesterday Summerside celebrated its sixtieth anniversary and the day will long be remembered by its citizens as a milestone in her history. The weather was gloriously fine and the streets were very gay with flags and bunting. An excellent programme had been arranged and townsmen and people from surrounding districts entered into the spirit of the day and made merry.

The afternoon was devoted to sports. There was a record attendance at the park for the races. Baseball was another item on the program. In the evening thousands gathered in Dominion Square for the band concert which was interspersed with speeches from ex-mayors and other prominent citizens. Following this half of the program there was a display of fireworks and street dancing. Mayor Lidstone presided over the function in the park. On the platform were previous Mayors of Summerside who are still living and residing in the town. They are Mr. J. Morrison, Mr. Justice Saunders, Mr. John E. Campbell, Mr. J. F. Arnett, Mr. E. W. Manson.

Mayor Lidstone opened the proceedings with a short review of the town's activities for the past 60 years since it was first incorporated. The ex-mayors all spoke in turn and referred to the past sixty years as one of great achievement for the town of Summerside. Mr. W. E. MacDonald, president of the Board of Trade, and Councilor MacKay also addressed the gathering. Other attractions were the picture at the Capitol Theatre and dances at the Capitol Grill and Olympia.

U.S. GOVERNOR CANCELS TRIP TO MARITIMES

BOSTON, Mass., July 1.—(Monday)—Thomas Buckley, Massachusetts State Auditor, has been named by Governor James M. Curley to fly to Nova Scotia tomorrow and fulfill his engagement at Annapolis.

Major General Rose, Mayor Timully, the Governor's aides, and J. Ernest Kerr will be in the plane. The start has been delayed from five to seven o'clock this morning so that Mr. Buckley may get in from Abington, his home.

BOSTON, Mass., June 30.—Governor James M. Curley, in an interview today explained why he had been forced to cancel his trip to Nova Scotia, where he was to be honored at public receptions, but gave assurance, if not a promise, that he would fulfill the engagements in the near future.

"It is a matter of deep personal regret that I was forced to cancel my Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island trip," declared the governor. "But circumstances, over which I have no control, make it imperative that I personally deliver a bonding message before the joint session of the Massachusetts Legislature tomorrow and remain close to the capital until the necessary legislation is passed. It means a great deal to the people of the Commonwealth, and the future of the state itself."

"However, you may assure my Nova Scotia friends, and those in Prince Edward Island as well, that I shall make my visit in the near future. I deeply regret the necessity of cancelling the trip to the Maritime Provinces at this time, but there was no other course for me to take."

RECORDER GIVES REPLY
The following communication from Recorder E. H. Strong was read at last Thursday's meeting of the Summerside Town Council:

Recorder's Reply
The Mayor and Councillors of the Town of Summerside.

In reply to communication from the Town Clerk addressed to me under date of June 27th in respect to the following motion passed at a meeting of the Town Council on June 25th, 1935:

"Resolved, that the Recorder be requested to give his opinion as to the legality of the majority of this Council requesting that a contract be entered into at this time with the Warren Paving Company for further pavement of certain streets in this town."

No doubt of perusal of my former letter of June 20th you will ascertain and no doubt understand that even for the protection of individual councillors as well as the Town itself all matters coming before the Council must be carried through in a legal manner, that is according to the proper procedure as laid down by the by-laws of the Town. The Incorporation Act, and the general laws of the land.

Any contract that might be entered into not according to law, each individual councillor might be personally liable if not the Town, so you can quite understand that it is essential that for the protection of the rate-payers of the Town of Summerside as well as for your own protection that everything be carried out in the manner above stated.

Briefly I may say you can quite understand the Town Council cannot elect or depose a mayor elected according to the laws of the Incorporation Act any more than a mayor can depose a councillor.

Secondly the Town Council would first have to have power to enter into such a contract for the paving of streets and would have to make provision for the fulfillment of the said contract by payment of the contract price.

If you would refer to The Incorporation Act or the amendments hereto dealing with authority given the Town to borrow money, you will find these Acts give the Town Council "power to borrow" and spend for specified purposes certain money limited in amount as stated in the said Act as for instance for the purpose of constructing permanent streets and when they think it in the interests of the Town so to do and any power that you now have along that line can be exercised, if the procedure is in conformity with the Town Act and the by-laws.

If the amount is not fixed by the statute it would be limited to the revenue for the current year.

This procedure is outlined in my previous letter.

In general as before stated, all powers given to the Town Council are purely statutory and as the Corporation has no common law existence, therefore, it is more essential that all matters be carried out in conformity with the statutes more so than a person dealing with their own private business.

Minor Injuries Received In Road Accident

Much smoke from little fire may adequately describe the rumor of the accident, which occurred at the paving plant on Saturday about noon. Stories of dreadful injuries were set at rest when it became known that Harry Currie, Charles Williams and a man named Lawlor had received superficial injuries as a result of being struck by the falling gravel bin. Currie, a hope as a home-brew hockey player, was the most seriously hurt, and was taken to the hospital for observation. It was found that no bones were broken, and that his injuries consisted chiefly of sore muscles and bruises.

It appears that one leg of the frame supporting the bin gave way, and the great container fell upon the men below. An ambulance was immediately called and the injured men were brought to the city.

In the bar room of the hotel, where they said he offered to buy them drinks. They arranged to meet Wednesday night, and Dickinson's body was found a few hours later.

"He looked like big dough to us," Ferris told the prosecutor. "We decided to get him drunk in his room the next night (Wednesday) and roll him, but he wouldn't get drunk. We got him to go for a ride with us and I went to Rouge Park. I stopped the car and Flossie and Jean got out. Bobbie (Loretta) stayed in the front seat."

"I told Dickinson to stick up his hand and he tried to fight me off. Then I let him have it. I threw the body out and took the coat and vest off, and Jean and Flossie went through the pockets while we drove back."

"We decided Detroit was too hot for us, and so we went to Chicago and then the girls went to Ft. Wayne to try to get work. I met them there the next day and they night we got pinched."
