Believe Chance Trapped Miners Still Alive

BELLAIRE, O., July 7 (AP) - Sixty-six men entombed in the Peshawar mine will be officially pronounced dead tomorrow, but tonight rescue workers set up drills to bore two shafts deep toward them on the faint chance they will be found alive. It may be two to five days before the nine-inch and three-inch shafts, three-quarters of a mile apart, are driven approximately 400 feet deep to a tunnel in which the men were caught behind a wall of flame that blocked the main shaft of Ohio's largest coal mine.

Parity Prices For Farm Products Is Problem

OTTAWA, July 8 (CP) - A clear definition of parity prices for various farm products probably will be possible after Agriculture Minister Gardiner presents to the Commons a promised bill establishing floor prices. "Thinking for parity prices, farmers in the past usually said they represented the prices received for their products in 1909-10, but there was what they called a satisfactory relationship with the price of goods they had to buy. Some have gone further back to find what they considered the best relationship between farm income and the price of goods they had to buy. They have argued that higher prices for farm products means little if the cost of goods they had to buy has increased beyond parity. Authorities said that parity prices should be considered when floors are established, otherwise the proposed protection for farmers against depression will have limited value. A floor satisfactory under existing conditions might be too high for the farmer because of commodity prices changes. The prospect, therefore, is that provision for parity prices will be based on the basis of parity established and a specified relationship between farm and other prices maintained.

New Glasgow To Have Air Express Service

MONCTON, N.B., July 7 - On Monday, July 10th, New Glasgow, N.S., will have its first direct air express service, according to P.M. Smith, Superintendent of Canadian National Express here which is carrying the new service by the Maritime Central Airways Ltd., from Moncton via Summerside and Charlottetown. This extended service, Mr. Smith said, will give direct connection with air express tracks in Nova Scotia, Halifax and Sydney are already provided with direct air express service.
