The following paragraphs are extracted from files of old newspapers published in April, exactly fifty years ago. On the 10th of that month it is evident that the spring had advanced about as far as it is this year. Passenger communication with the mainland was being maintained by the ice-boat at Cape Traverse and the mails were brought to Charlottetown by couriers. The ice was partly cleared out of Charlottetown harbor as it is today. A page of one newspaper is taken up with the report of the Prince Edward Island Association in connection with the promoting of Christianity among the Jews. A report is also given of Miller's Dramatic Panorama, which was a series of paintings mechanically contrived to pass before the eyes of the audience and display in succession the scenes portrayed on the canvas.

The local legislature was prorogued that year on the 14th of April and in reference to this Hazard's Gazette said: "We notice with satisfaction the soldierly appearance of Captain Rankin's guard of honor. We are no advocates of war and we trust never to have to dread the approach to our shores of an enemy, yet as such an event may possibly occur it would be prudent to be in some measure prepared for it, etc., etc."

Miss Amy Allyn sang selections which gained the favor of the audience. Tonight there will be an entire change of program presenting as the feature Sherlock Holmes.

At the meeting of the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade held on Saturday afternoon, the correspondence with the Minister of Marine and the captains of the winter steamers was brought down and showed that President Tidmarsh had made the most energetic efforts to have the boats brought to Charlottetown. A letter from Vernon River Bridge was read relative to the need of dredging that port. President Tidmarsh reported to the Telephone Committee that the committee appointed by the Board asked the Government to require the following concessions from the company (1) District main line between Charlottetown and Summerside and lines to East Point and West Cape, (2) The removal of the exchanges from country stores to more private places, (3) A reduction in tolls and rents, (4) Cheaper telephone for country services. No exemption from taxation was to be granted, and the franchise was to be extended five years only. The committee had been informed that the company had submitted their annual financial statement to the Government and that it showed the impossibility of reducing the rents or tolls, that the company's contemplated improvements meant the expenditure of large sums, and that there were many now paying offices that would have to be dropped unless a subsidy was provided. After discussion by Hon. Mr. Hughes, George E. Full, F. H. Beer, S. W. Crabbe and Nelson Rattenbury it was unanimously resolved that in view of the proposed telephone legislation at Ottawa it is desirable that nothing be done by the Provincial Legislature at the present session, and that in the meantime the

Bill proposed to be introduced, be published for the benefit of the public. In the matter of the winter freight rates charged it was resolved that the Board of Trade immediately report the discriminations against the port of Charlottetown to the Minister of Railways, and the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, asking that refunds be made to shippers of all over-charges, and that hereafter, Charlottetown be granted the same advantages in the matter of through rates as Georgetown and Summerside. A copy of this resolution was ordered to be sent the ministers at Ottawa and to every member of the Dominion Parliament.
