POLICE COURT RECORD.—During the past year there were 258 convictions and 67 dismissals at the Charlottetown Police Court, a total of 325. In 1914 there were 324 convictions and 83 dismissals, a total of 417. Last year there were 158 convictions and 28 dismissals for drunkenness, compared with 228 and 24 respectively for 1915. Last year there were 25 convictions and 3 dismissals for breach of the Prohibition Act. The previous year the numbers were 38 and 35.

FREELAND.—The semi-annual examination of Freeland School was held on the afternoon of Monday, Dec. 20th. The examination was conducted by the teacher, assisted by Misses Phillips, Gavin, Sherry and Kilbride. The prompt and correct answers of the pupils evinced the great care with which they have been taught. A program consisting of choruses, dialogues and recitations was well rendered by the pupils between the classes. The examination was brought to a close by singing the National Anthem.

S. S. EMPRESS.—The S. S. Empress will make her last trip on the Summerside—Pt. de Chene route today after returning from Summerside tonight she will proceed to Charlottetown. A special train will leave Charlottetown at 6 a. m. on Monday with mails and passengers to connect with the Stanley, which will start the service on the Cape Tormentine route. A special train will also be run on the N. B. and P. E. I. Railway connect with the Ocean Limited train 199, West, and Sackville.

PROHIBITION AMENDMENT.—By proclamation of his Honour Lieutenant Governor Macdonald the first section of the "Act to further amend the various acts relating to the prohibition of intoxicating liquors," will come into effect on the 15th day of January. The section referred to amends section 2 of said Act by striking out that part thereof which permits the sale of Malt beer containing less than three per cent. of Alcohol that it prohibits the sale of any beer containing alcohol in any quantity.

KING GEORGE FARMER'S INSTITUTE.—A meeting of this society was held at Murray River, on Dec. 27 the Vice-President Mr. E. G. Giddings occupying the chair. The committee appointed to canvass the west end of the district for members reported a total of 35 in their district. The following directors were elected for the ensuing year: John D. Livingston, John T. Lowe, Wm. C. Hayter, T. L. Cooke, Robert Whitney, Daniel McDonald, Ira D. Munn, Daniel Bull, Matthew McLeod. It was decided to ask Prof. Ross to come out to Murray River Jan. 3rd, to arrange for the coming year. The following meeting will be held at an institute meeting same place Jan. 10th. At the close of the meeting the directors met and elected the following officers: Pres. Mr. Robert Whitney, Vice-Pres. John D. Livingston, Secy-Geo. H. Moore, Auditor, John T. Lowe.

CANADIAN DENTAL CORP.—It is interesting to note that in connection with the Canadian Army now on active service there is in addition to the regular Medical Corps, a dental corps consisting of Lieut. Col. J. A. Armstrong, Ottawa, Major J. A. Smith, Ottawa, second in command, and 25 captains, 25 lieutenants (with rank of captain while overseas), and 25 undergraduates. Each of these officers has under him a sergeant, who does the laboratory work, and also a "batman," practically a servant. The P. E. Island Dental Association is represented on this corps by Captain E. McNeill, D.D.S., Altonburg, Sergeants Harold Phillips, Charlottetown, and Pte. Thos. Fitzgerald, Altonburg, who recently went overseas to go on active service. The above were on duty previous to November 1st. Since then a corps attached to the Sixth Division has been organized, with Dr. P. K. Thompson, D.D.S., Halifax, in command. The overseas address of the members of these corps is care of Chief Dental Surgeon, C.E.F., Folkestone, England.

The death took place in this city on Thursday the 30th, of Mrs. John Stewart at the age of 68. The late Mrs. Stewart was of a kind and loving disposition and will be greatly missed by the neighbors and more especially in the home where she always proved to be an ideal mother. The late Mrs. Stewart was in excellent health up to a few days ago when she took suddenly ill and notwithstanding all that medical skill and kindness could do her spirit passed away to him who gave life, fortified by the last rites of the Catholic Church. 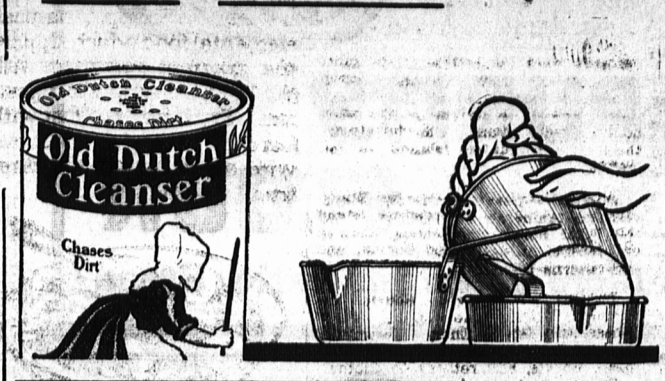

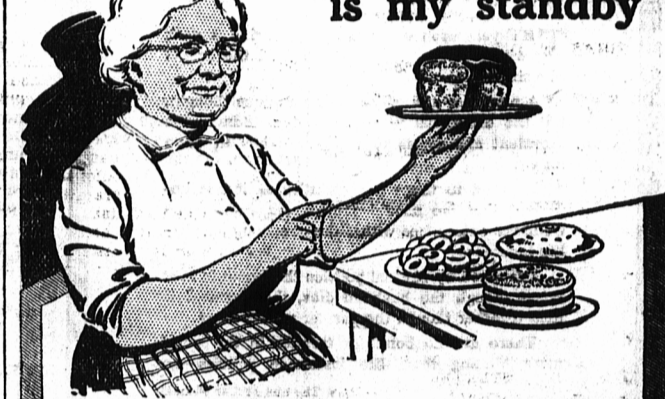

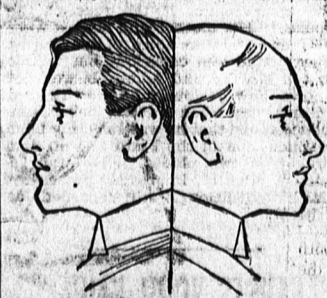
