The Contest closes on November 30th, 1925, when the slogan will be judged by three well known Islanders representing both Town and Country interests.

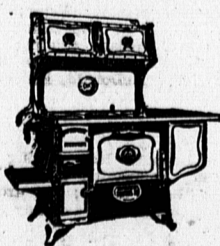
The Contest is open to any one and there is no restriction as to the number of slogans which may be sent in by any one person.
