B. C. FRUIT TOOK MEDAL

LONDON, Nov. 21.—(Special).—At the Scottish Horticultural Association meeting at Edinburgh, a gold medal has been awarded for the British Columbia fruit exhibit, which also took the highest award at the exhibition of the Corn Exchange at Sheffield and the gold medal of the Saxton Society at Chester.

The fruit is now being exhibited at the coliseum in Bristol and also at Bolton and Howick.

Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Scott is expected to arrive in London to attend the annual show of the Royal Horticultural Society at Westminster in December, where a Canadian exhibit will be made.

DOES NOT BELIEVE STEFANSSON LOST

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—(Special).—Dr. Frederick A. Luess, director of the American Museum of Natural History, doubts the truth of the report from Seattle that the members of the Arctic expedition headed by Vilhjalmur Stefansson have been lost.

"Let us wait for further reports," he said, "before forming any conclusion as to the probable fate of Mr. Stefansson and those with him. The story as published is not accurate. Dr. Rudolph H. Anderson, the zoologist, was not with Mr. Stefansson aboard the Karluk, as the report says, but has taken the Alaska, one of the four schooners in Mr. Stefansson's flotilla, and gone into the northwest while the Stefansson party proceeded to the east after visiting Herschel Island late in August.

"The whole thing strikes me as being purely a rumor grown into a report. The mere fact that no word has been heard from Mr. Stefansson since August 20 does not alarm me. I do not believe that the Karluk was equipped with wireless and it would have been an easy matter for Mr. Stefansson to have gotten out of touch with civilization.

"On previous trips, Mr. Stefansson has been lost to civilization for several months and there is no cause for worry because of his silence of two and a half."

Assistant Secretary Sherwood, of the Museum, said: "Mr. Stefansson knows the north; he has had vast experience as an explorer, and is a man of resources. So are his associates. If I did not hear from him for a year I would not be worried."

"The report of the probable death of Stefansson and his party on board the Karluk was brought down from the north by late-arriving whalers, who told of raging storms ravaging the Alaskan coast. The Karluk took with her food and miscellaneous equipment to tide the explorers over a period of two years. The vessel is in command of Captain Robert Bartlett, who commanded Rear Admiral Peary's journey to the North Pole. Besides Captain Bartlett and First Mate Anderson, there is a crew of twelve. The scientific department is represented by fifteen men, including Diamond Jenness and Henri Benquet, anthropologists, Kenneth Gordon (Chicago) and John Ralston Cox, geographers; Burton Merton McConnell, meteorologist, and Dr. Alister Forbes McKay, surgeon. The expedition was fitted out by the Canadian Government in the hope that it might establish trade routes and discover copper deposits.

HOW ROCKEFELLER STARTED

Opportunity! Four dollars a week was the salary John D. Rockefeller received for his first job in Cleveland just 58 years ago. He was paid this for acting as assistant bookkeeper and in three years was advanced to the post of bookkeeper and cashier. Mr. Rockefeller's biography tells that in those early days of low wages and hard work he was saving a little money, although he never failed to be a contributor to the church and other deserving causes. Today he is one of the wealthiest men in the world. The story of his life reveals a trying experience in establishing himself in the oil business. Many questioned whether it could be established on a permanent basis. There was doubt whether the supply of oil would last and whether there would be sufficient uses for it. The recollections of Mr. Rockefeller, published some time ago, show that he had the courage to take advantage of his opportunity. He risked all his little savings and all that he could borrow. Eventually, luck, persistence, industry and courage won the day. There is a lesson in this for young men who are complaining of the lack of opportunity.—Leslie's.
