possible, not only in the summer months, but also during the winter.

DRAWING NO. 1—BLOCK PLAN

After studying the problem, the architects were convinced that it would be a mistake to plan the buildings that the public would cross the site in front of the main hospital building.

The kitchen entrance would be shielded by trellis work on low retaining walls which would permit the ground outside this entrance to be paved at such a level that goods would be delivered without having to be taken down steps.

FARRING SPACE, ETC.

If the road outside the western boundary is developed immediately, there might be an economy in connecting the parking space in front of the hospital out to this roadway, so that cars might come in where shown on the plan, pass across the front of the hospital, and go out by this western road, hitting back on Brighton Road where it joins North River Road.

PLANT EQUIPMENT

The heating plant, laundry, etc., are located inside the boundary line in the vicinity of the barn, etc., which belong to the Government House, and it is suggested that the power line which now crosses the hospital site from north to south should be moved over, so that it follows the boundary line skirting the south east side of the vegetable garden shown on the plan.

DELIVERY OF PATIENTS

The delivery of patients and their friends to the main entrance of the hospital is as direct as can be from the north side, ambulance cases being taken underneath the flight of steps which leads to the first floor where the main administrative section is located.

SOLARIA

The following rooms are provided: Ground Floor: 1 unallotted room in the centre of the building facing south.

Summarizing requirements as recommended with the plans as submitted in which the accommodation has been adjusted to some extent, they compare as follows:

- Private rooms, recommended, 46 patients. Provided, 32 patients. Semi-private, recommended, 30 patients, provided 36 patients. 3 bed wards, recommended, provided, 21 patients. 4 bed wards, recommended, provided, none. 6 bed wards, recommended, 30. Isolation, recommended, 10 patients, provided, 6 patients. Totals: Recommended, 108. Provided, 107.

POINTS OF INTEREST

On all floors the development of the two future wings would necessitate only minor changes in the structure as planned now, yet the added spaces would be convenient to all services now being provided.

Ground Floor

First Floor

Third Floor

Private patients in east wing. Semi-private patients in west wing. Rooms with private bath segregated.

One office controlling all entrances to Surgical, X-ray, Dental, Laboratory or Ear, Nose and Throat Departments.

7 double rooms, 14 beds. 1 Superintendent's suite of bedroom, sitting room and bath.

First Floor Accommodation

13 private rooms, 13 beds. 5 double rooms, 10 beds. Total, 23 beds. 1 supervisor's suite of bedroom, sitting room and bath.

Second Floor

10 double rooms, 20 beds. 2 single rooms, 2 beds. Total, 22 beds. Sitting room facing south would provide for social amenities separate from nurses.

Basement Floor

A small laundry and drying-room would provide for individual laundry work not sent into hospital laundry.

Ground Floor

Kitchen projected beyond line of main hospital building, providing means of additional lighting from lantern lights on the roof through which air could also be drawn and exhausted up through the building to the fan room above the main roof.

First Floor

Entrance hall with adjacent offices, enquiry, waiting room and hospital services so that visitors do not come into contact with hospital activities unless this is necessary.

TRURO WOULD NOT DESERT EASTERN LOOP

Opinion Expressed Proposed Hockey Circuit Could Not Function.

TRURO, Sept. 10.—Some comment has been created in hockey circles here by the despatch from Charlottetown appearing Monday in The Halifax Herald expressing the hope that a new Maritime Hockey League would be formed which would embrace Fredericton, Moncton, Charlottetown and, possibly Truro. Just what efforts would be made to form up such a circuit could not be learned here, but it is known that some of the local hockey moguls have been approached with suggestions along these lines.

Jumps Too Far
