DE VALERA MAKES PLEA

LONDON, Sept. 17.—In a telegram sent last evening to Premier Lloyd George at Gairloch, Scotland, Mr. De Valera is considered in high quarters of London to have indicated the desire for a continuation looking to peace for Ireland, which were terminated momentarily at least by Mr. De Valera's communication earlier in the week, insisting on an independence of Ireland and Mr. Lloyd George's cancellation of the conference with delegates of Sinn Fein which he proposed for next Tuesday. The telegram of Mr. De Valera was as follows: "I received your telegram last night and am surprised you do not see that if we, on our side, accepted the conference on the basis of your letter of September 7th, without making our position quite clear, Ireland's representatives would enter the conference with their position misunderstood, and cause Ireland's right to be irrevocably prejudiced. Throughout the correspondence that has taken place, you have defined your government's position. We have defined ours. If positions were not so definitely opposed, there would indeed be no problem to be discussed. It should be obvious that in a case like ours if there is to be any results negotiators must meet without prejudice and untrammelled by those conditions whatsoever, except those imposed by the facts as they know them."

MUCH OBLIGED

The site of the old house is on the farm of John Mutch.

Alexander Mutch was twice married and was the father of 18 children 10 boys and 8 girls. His first wife was a widow named Mrs. Smith and the second was Catherine Nicholson, an immigrant from the Highlands of Scotland who arrived on the ship Polly in 1805. Miss Nicholson was more at home in the Gaelic tongue than the English, and was noted as a beautiful singer. Alexander Mutch had a school education which few of the common British people had at that time. This was because of the School Act of 1896 which was passed by the Scottish Parliament and which was far in advance of any educational legislation in England, Ireland, or the Colonies.

Alexander Mutch, died in 1825 for 1826 at the age of 72.

A PAGE OF SCOTCH CANADIAN FAMILY HISTORY.

(The Aberdeen Free Press of August 30th.)

On August 6 a "Mutch Picnic" held at the shore of Mr. David Mutch Mt. Herbert. It was a grand reunion of the descendants of Alexander Mutch who emigrated from Aberdeenshire over 150 years ago. There were 75 Mutches present besides 50 or more people descended maternally from Alexander Mutch. The following paper was read by Mr. J. Robert Mutch, of Mt. Herbert, a great grandson Mr. Mutch would be pleased to have correspondence with any of the Mutches of Scotland:—

The progenitor of the Mutches of Prince Edward Island was Alexander Mutch. He was a Scotchman and was borne in Aberdeenshire, Scotland, but emigrated to the British Colonies when 21 years of age. He and his brother John enlisted in the British Army in the American Revolutionary War. They were in the same regiment and fought at the battle of Bunkers Hill, 1775. John did not answer his name at the roll call after the battle, and he was never heard of again. Alexander did not receive a scratch during the whole of the war. In 1786, or three years after peace was declared, Sergeant Mutch remained there but a short time and settled on a farm along the Hillsborough River in Lot 48. The farm is now divided into three and owned by Messrs John Mutch, David Mutch, and James Munn.
