THE PHONE DIRECTORY

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the circulation department proper, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertising and are on the same footing as non-subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or in the Evening Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or otherwise. When for church or charitable purposes they seldom ever say so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same, all of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order for advertising of churches & charities. In all such cases the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time. People write this office to know if News, Letters to Editor, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items etc., of a money making nature, even though they be somewhat of a news nature, are chargeable. For instance, the advance notice or notices of a concert, lecture, picnic, etc., are chargeable if there is an admission fee, silver collection, sale of pies or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even though a taken collection, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of any past present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Verses accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable but once in either Morning Daily or Evening Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 1.—Frank Gotch retained his supremacy as wrestling champion of the world tonight, defeating George Lurich, of Russia, in two straight falls at Convention hall. Gotch secured the first fall in 13 minutes 10 seconds, and the second in five minutes 35 seconds.

OF SPECIAL INTEREST

PARIS, April 3 (Special)—A Chinese bank, bearing the title Banque Industrielle de Chine, is soon to be established here by a group of French, Belgian and German capitalists, who have obtained from the government of the Chinese Republic a concession to undertake all kinds of banking business in China as well as to finance and operate certain industrial enterprises.

The new bank's statutes were ratified by the Chinese government on January 11. The capital will be 45,000,000 (\$9,000,000), divided into 87,000 ordinary shares and 3,000 founders' shares of 500f. (\$100) each. The Chinese government has agreed to subscribe one-third of the capital and reserves to itself the right to subscribe to a third of any increase in capital which the bank may make in future.

The bank will have the right to issue bank notes, which will be legal tender in certain provinces, to be fixed by the Chinese government, or even throughout the territory of the Chinese Republic, until such time as the government promulgates a law regulating the issue of bank notes.

The bank will be allowed to take part in industrial, commercial, agricultural and mining enterprises, the proceeds of the payment of the coupons of the Chinese debt, treasury bonds and all payments on behalf of the Chinese governments.

It will also be allowed to subscribe to loans, both on its own account and on behalf of third parties. It is understood that six months after the bank's definite foundation the capital may be raised to nearly 100,000,000f. (\$20,000,000).

any member of that house grudging a few dollars on cigars, carriages and other means of entertainment to a Minister visiting the Island. (Applause.)

A BAD ADVERTISEMENT

HON. MR. DALTON associated himself with the other members of the government in protesting against such a motion being recorded in the journals of the house, and what was perhaps worse for the reputation of the Island, appearing in the public press. Mr. White had been invaluable to them in the assistance he had rendered in furthering our claims, and surely it was very bad policy from every point of view to question any little expense they should incur in seeing that he enjoyed himself when he came to the Island. (Applause.) What would the hon. member for West Cape (Mr. McWilliams) think if (Mr. Dalton) invited him to his house and entertained him, and then put on record the details of the entertainment for all and sundry to see? He was sure he would not appreciate hospitality of that kind; and yet that was exactly what he was asking the Government to do with reference to an honored guest they had entertained here last summer. (Applause.) After all it was a paltry sum, and although they had cost of entertaining the Finance Minister about \$200, was too little and wished to suggest they might be a little more lavish. But after the expression of opinions he might see his way to withdraw his motion.

MOTION WITHDRAWN

MR. McWILLIAMS in reply to the discussion said he was still of opinion that the question was a just one, but after the views that had been expressed he was prepared to withdraw his motion. The details, he thought, the public were entitled to, and if nothing wrong with them he did not see why they should not be placed on the table.

THE PREMIER

We are quite prepared to do so if the hon. member insists. MR. McWILLIAMS did not see anything unusual in the information asked for, and he was sure similar questions had been put by the Premier when in opposition. THE PREMIER: I challenge the hon. member to prove that. MR. McWILLIAMS said he was speaking from recollection, but he

was not going to insist upon the information being produced, and therefore would not press his motion.

THE SPEAKER reminded members that when, in the opinion of the Government, it was not in the public interest that a question should be answered the information could be withheld. He did not say this was such a question, but just mentioned the fact for the information of members. By leave of the House the motion was then withdrawn.

PROHIBITION RETURNS

MR. RICHARDS asked the Hon. Leader of the Government to lay on the table the reports of Prosecutors under the Act relating to the Prohibition of intoxicating liquor. The number of prosecutions entered, also a list of all fines imposed by the Stipendiary Magistrates throughout the province, by whom imposed, the amount of fines collected from each offender, the number of fines imposed and not collected and the reason why. THE PREMIER: Is it for fifteen months or a year? MR. RICHARDS: For the fifteen months.
