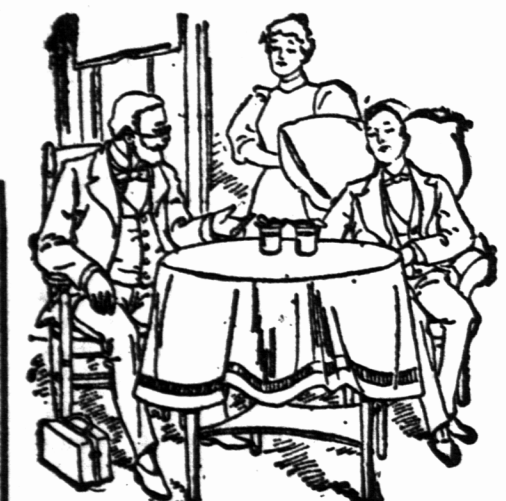


THE WEATHER.

THE LAND OF THE BLACK MAN.

One of the results of the war now going on has been to center the attention of the world with an intensity never before felt on the land of the black man, the dark continent of Africa. For countless ages, Africa has been the unknown, the abode of barbarism, where heathenism had degenerated below the range of idol worship to fetishism, where slavery and cannibalism prevailed and all the land was filled with "the habitations of cruelty."

And yet in the earlier ages some African countries were very prominent in the world's affairs and in the semi-civilization of those ancient times. The range of seventy pyramids in Egypt contains some of the oldest, the most gigantic and enduring of the works of man, dating backward as archaeologists estimate, 4,000 years before the Christian era, and 2,000 years before the time of Abraham.

During the years of the last century and the earlier years of the century now closing, the slave trade was in full blast and the ships of Christian nations were engaged in the unholy traffic of deporting black men, women and children to the plantations of North and South America and various other parts of the world, to be sold as slaves to white masters.

A hundred years ago Mungo Park penetrated from the West coast to Central Africa, and since then David Livingston, Henry M. Stanley and others have by brave and arduous efforts done much to make the interior of the Dark Continent known. British occupation of Egypt has lifted half the once intolerable burdens of the fellaheen, and given to the native toilers a measure of protection, of justice of the fruits of their own toil never before enjoyed.

Britain has unquestionably done more than all other nations for the protection, the uplifting and enlightenment of the land of the black man. And what she has already done is but a prelude to what she will yet accomplish. Already she is pushing railways and telegraphs downward from the north and upwards from the south which before many years will meet at the equator, and the heart of the continent will then be opened up to Christianity, civilization and commerce.

No devout student of the progress of the world can doubt that to Britain has been entrusted the stupendous mission for the regeneration of Africa, and that her flag, her just government and equal laws will yet prevail over a vast empire in that

continent in which the horrible midnight darkness of past ages will have forever passed away and justice and enlightenment will expand and prevail during the brighter future.

Lady Lansdowne, formerly a resident of Ottawa when her husband was Governor General, was the foremost promoter of a recent patriotic concert at Covent Garden at which Patti sang. There was a great attendance of royalty, nobility and gentry and the prices of boxes ranged from \$500 to \$1,250 each. The big sum of \$55,000 was raised as the proceeds of this one concert.

In the Presidential election of 1896 in the United States the total popular vote cast was 13,923,378. Of these Mr. McKinley received 7,104,779 and Bryan 6,502,925 while over 300,000 votes were thrown in favor of four other candidates. McKinley had a popular majority in 23 States and Bryan in 22 States. In the electoral college McKinley received 271 votes and Bryan only 176.
