She was bred by the late Austin Hewitt, Charlottetown, who turned her over to Jack Irving. The writer bought her in 1913 and bred her with considerable success in 1914. During the war she passed into the ownership of the late Montague, who won quite a few races with her in this Province and on the mainland, and in 1919-1923 she was going strong, with Johnny McCabe driving.

We remember of a particularly close race September 29th, 1920, at the Province Exhibition, Charlottetown. Orwell Belle won with a summary of 1-2-3-1-1. Roy Miller, owned and driven by the writer was 4-1-1-2-2; time, 2:18 1-2, 2:19 3-4, 2:21, 2:25 1-2. The following Orwell Belle was started again in a good field of trotters. The British Soldier, owned by Stanley Wedlock and driven by the writer was 1-1-1-1-2. Orwell Belle, 2-4-2, 2:18 1-2, 2:19 3-4, 2:19. In the two days Orwell Belle had races eight heat with innumerable scores with a heavy track, which shows what a tough, good race mare she was.

Lazzeri signs With San Francisco Seals

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24 (AP)—Tony Lazzeri, the original "poosh 'em up" man of baseball, signed his contract with San Francisco Seals today to pave the way for what may be the final and one of the most unusual chapters of his long and brilliant playing career.

Reared in this city and a "boy wonder" product of its playgrounds, Lazzeri travelled practically around the baseball world to arrive as a member of his old home town's team for the first time in twenty years. He managed Toronto Maple Leafs of the International League last year.

Memories by Harry Jewitt, Fredericton, N.B. (Continued from last week). "In the fall of 1903 I became interested in stock horses. The following winter I left for Crawfordville, Indiana, and between trains stopped at Columbus, Ohio, and visited McLaughlin Brothers' big barn. They had some of the most beautiful high-stepping French coach stallions I had ever seen. One of them was taken in and out of the ring. I became acquainted with William, one of the firm. He was the one who would go to France each year for stallions.

They showed me a great three-year-old Hackney named Hamlet, that had shortly before won first prize in the Chicago International and told me that if I bought him they would give me the prize ribbon to take home with me. Well, I bought Hamlet for \$1,000. Next day they brought him to town where I had a car ready to load him for home. Before shipping I thought I had better have him shod with caulked shoes as we had lots of snow and ice at the end of his journey.

There are usually lots of loafers in a blacksmith shop. On this occasion there happened to be a young man who talked too much for the good of all concerned. He wanted to hand me all kinds of excuses and reasons why Hamlet had not won first prize at Chicago. When I told him that the colt did win first and I showed the ribbon he closed up like a clam and I could get no more from him.

Soon after reaching home I got busy. I wrote the Secretary of the Chicago International and learned that the colt Hamlet had won no prizes. I learned a lot from the Secretary of the Registry Association that was anything but complimentary to Mr. Cochrane. From Harvey Jackson and Joe Primeau each had 20 points. Final statistics that year showed Jackson with 53 points, Primeau with 49 and Cochrane 48.

Red Wings Score Two Goals In Overtime To Defeat Americans 4-2

DETROIT, Jan. 24 (AP)—Detroit Red Wings defeated New York Americans 4-2 tonight, counting twice in a bitterly fought overtime period to move into second place in the National Hockey League.

A crowd of 5,266 saw the Red Wings put on a story-book finish that began with a 105-foot shot by Eddie Wares, who whipped the puck into the net from a spot just past the centre circle. Then almost before the applause had subsided, Syd Howe streaked down the left side that also got past goalie Earl Robertson.

Each team scored once in the first period and again in the second. They argued for several minutes after Clarence held the goal. John Mowers unintentionally batted the puck into the stands in making a save.

Charles Conacher cashed in on the penalty and forced the game into overtime.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24 (AP)—At the request of a group of British sportsmen promoter Mike Jacobs agreed to stage a series of boxing shows throughout the United States between picked teams of American and British professional fighters for the benefit of the British Red Cross and Canteen Service.

One of the fights would be a heavyweight title bout, with Joe Louis defending his crown for the second time against Tommy Farr, the durable Briton.

The entire plan hinges on whether the British sportsmen can obtain permission from their government to send the fight mission to the United States.

The British team would include Farr and five British champions in lighter divisions. There would be lightweight Len Harvey and middleweight Jock MacAvoy, both of whom campaigned in the United States some years ago; welterweight Ernie Roderick, who was outpointed by Henry Armstrong in a world title bout in London in 1933; lightweight Tom Moon and flyweight Jackie Paterson.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24 (CP)—The American Hockey League today granted a franchise to Washington D.C., extending its agreement with the National Hockey League until the end of the season and decided to open its play this March 18.

Governors of the league in session here decided that the playoffs for the Calder Cup will be on the same basis as last year. The clubs leading the two sections will hold a three-of-five game series for the right to meet the winner of the second-third eliminations in the three-of-five game final.

The teams finishing second will play a two-of-three series as will the teams finishing third. The winners of these series will meet each other for the right to play the survivor of the first-place series.

The new franchise, which will bring the league up to 10 clubs, was awarded to the Uline Arena of Washington, of which Mike Uline is general manager. Raoul Le Mat, former noted skater and hockey player now resident in Washington, is interested in the venture.

Washington will join the eastern section of the league, now composed of New Haven, Philadelphia, Providence and Springfield. It will begin operations next autumn.

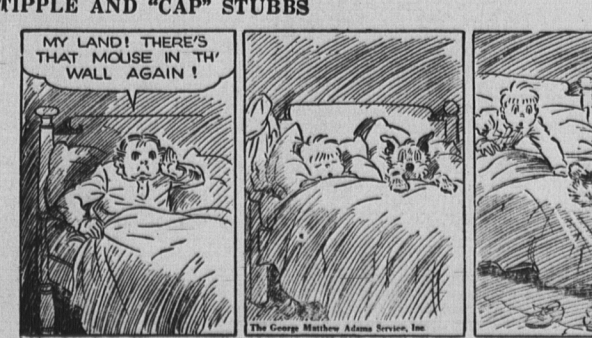
