PRODUCE

(Canadian Press)—(C.P.)—With receipts for the week in advance of the previous week's figures, prices on the Montreal dairy and produce market were irregular last week. Cheese and potatoes advanced while eggs and butter eased slightly. The most important event of the week was the first board of trade's weekly auctions, which will be continued throughout the season.

Butter prices were generally quoted fractionally lower. No 1 regraded in carlots or less sold at 18 to 18 1/2 cents a pound as against 18 1/2 to 18 3/4 cents at the previous week's close. Offerings were 17,816 boxes, an increase over the previous week's 15,192 and 16,095 for the corresponding period a year ago.
