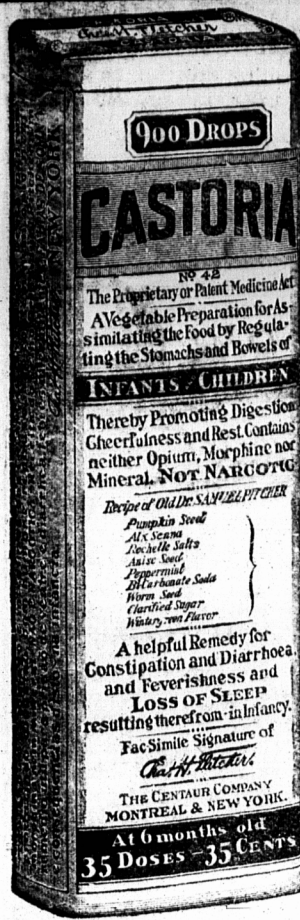

LT.-COL. PRINGLE NEW MODERATOR

HAMILTON, June 7.—Lieut.-Col. the Rev. John Pringle, D. D., of Sydney, N. S., was elected Moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly by unanimous vote at the opening of the 45th annual meeting at St. Paul's Church here, Dr. Pringle's first charge was at Georgetown, Ont. Later he ministered as a missionary in the Yukon during the gold rush. He also served for over four years as a chaplain with the Canadian forces in the war.

Dr. Pringle's name was proposed by Rev. Principal McKinnon of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, N. S., and seconded by Rev. Prof. Baird, of Winnipeg.

In the neighborhood of 500 delegates are attending the assembly, which has many matters of great importance to deal with at the present session. The formal opening of the assembly took place in the customary form of a service, which was conducted in St. Paul's Church. The sermon was preached by the retiring Moderator, Rev. Dr. Colin Fletcher of Thames Road. "It is with gratitude of heart and with thanksgiving upon our lips that we assemble this evening," he declared in commencing his remarks.

"We remember that when we assembled last year how dark everything seemed. Our soldiers overseas were being hard pressed by a relentless foe. How earnest were our pleadings and our confessions at that time! Forward became the marching note of that assembly, and the year has been a remarkable one in many respects. God has brought great things to us. We acknowledge His goodness in bringing victory to our arms, so that hostilities have ceased.

Disturbing Element

"We should at this time give thanks and at the same time rededicate ourselves to His work, for although it is true that things are not as black now, yet I take it you all recognize that the situation which has arisen is as serious in many respects as was the war. There is a disturbing element at work in every country. Muttering undertones are heard on every side demanding changes, betterment of conditions and many other things. It is therefore fitting that in our services here we should dedicate ourselves to the work of God." He urged his hearers to "carry on" in the forward movement, which, he said, has already attained gratifying results. He proceeded to cite some factors which he described as of paramount importance at the present time.

"The first," he continued, "is the need of the recognition of the supremacy of Christ and a willing submission to His authority. In all realms, in every department of life, that is the greatest need today." Dr. Fletcher alluded to the covetousness which proved the downfall of Judas, and warned his fellow-ministers of the danger of becoming too much interested in the

financial side of the Church, which the needs of the hour, he remarked, have brought more and more into the minister's sphere of activity.

Spirit of Camraderishp

Christ used the word "comrade" in addressing the laborers in the vineyard, he went on and added that in the present day the Church may well follow this example in the broad field of labor generally. He supported the plan followed by a number of ministers in studying the subject of economics, although he pointed out that a particular ability is necessary to understand and discuss intelligently the problems connected therewith. The responsibility of the State in the matter of economics is very heavy at the present time, he stated, and he urged general prayer for the endowment of affairs with the special wisdom and foresight, which, he said, were needed now. He appealed strongly for the spreading by the Church of the message of comradeship in this field. In conclusion, he declared, preach the personal Christ, the personal Lord, the personal friend, the personal comrade. Remember always that the Saviour of the world is a person, not a condition, not a principle, but a great and glorious person.

Echo of Strike

Immediately at the close of the service the assembly was formally constituted. The clerk in reporting on the assembly roll of accredited delegates, mentioned that as a result of the disordered conditions existing in Winnipeg the names from the Winnipeg Presbytery had not reached him through the mail, and that therefore it was necessary to leave a blank. The names of the delegates were added to the roll at the meeting.

Relinquishing his office, Dr. Fletcher made the suggestion that the Moderator be relieved of all other work and left free to perform the many duties of his office.

After Dr. Pringle had been declared elected he was conducted to the Moderator's chair. Briefly expressing his

thanks he mentioned the fact that he was ordained at the same time as his predecessor in office, and had preached in St. Paul's Church in this city forty years ago this Summer. He cited strong support of the forward movement throughout the year.

The thanks of the assembly were heartily tendered the retiring Moderator. In reply Dr. Fletcher made feeling reference to the deaths of many prominent members of the Church during the past year, among them the treasurer, Rev. Dr. Somerville of Toronto.
