The following prohibition cases were disposed of before Stipendiary Inman at Souris on the 11th. Campbell vs. Jemima McMillan, defendant fined \$50 and costs; Campbell vs. Foley, dismissed; Campbell vs. McNeill, dismissed; Campbell vs. R. E. Anderson, second offence, fined \$100 and costs. On Saturday last at Georgetown, John T. O'Brien, Lot 40, was convicted of a third offence against C. T. A. and sentenced to four months in jail.

The attendance at the Saturday evening session of the Convention held in Zion Presbyterian church was small, but the meeting was of great interest and profit to all who attended. R. C. Morse, New York, was the first speaker, and the subject of his address was the World's Jubilee Congress held in Paris last April. At the first Paris conference held 50 years ago only two countries were represented, North America and Europe. The 1000 delegates who assembled in the same city last April represented almost all the continents of the globe. The Young Men's Christian Association seeks to unite all young men who believe in Jesus Christ as God and Saviour in the extension of his kingdom among young men. Fifty years ago the work was an undeveloped one, though possessing vast possibilities, and was addressed almost exclusively to the religious side of the life of men. Now it is a developed work.

At the adjourned meeting of the Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Protection Association held in the City Building last Friday evening, the constitution and bye-laws were adopted. F. W. Hyndman, President, occupied the chair, and John Richards, Vice President for Prince County was present and amongst others addressed the meeting. The Association has good hopes of the membership running up into the thousands and as a consequence our streams and game in the future will be properly protected—a resolution was passed requesting the executive to memorialize the Federal Government to permit trout fishing by hook and line only through the ice in the country and of February, March and April, but fish so caught not to be under seven inches in length and not to be exposed for sale. This will if the Government permits it, allow people to catch trout for their own use in the winter months. A proposition was also made to request the Local Government to appoint Game Wardens, and to enforce a gun license, the charge for residents to be fifty cents and for non-residents ten dollars per year, but this latter proposition was allowed to stand over for further consideration. It is expected that the Tourist Association will work in harmony with this society as it will doubtless prove of much advantage to tourists, in that the fish and game will by their exertions be fully restored. The Fish and Game Protection Association is now fully organized and mean business.
