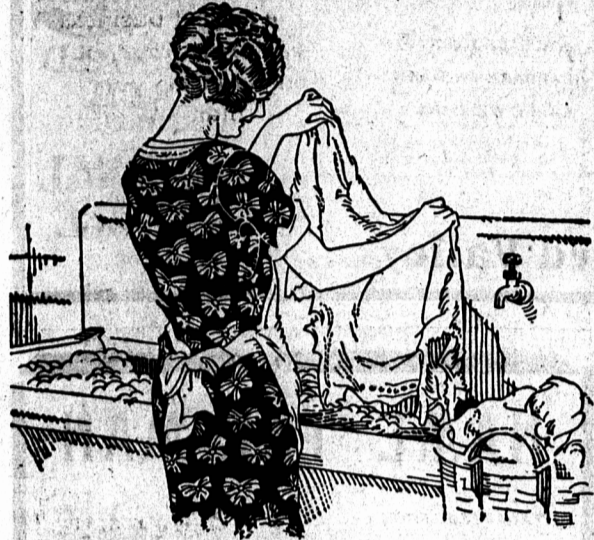

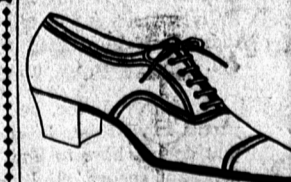

### Prison Farm in East Hinted at

(Canadian Press.) HALIFAX, May 28.—A prison farm or some similar institution under the combined direction of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Government was fore-shadowed in a brief speech delivered today by Hon. W. J. O'Hearn, Attorney General of Nova Scotia, in introducing Dr. Alfred E. Lavelle, secretary and chief officer of the Board of Parole of the Province of Ontario, who was speaker at the Commercial Club luncheon. The Attorney-General said that the governments of the two provinces would shortly confer on a project to establish such an institution.
