W. R. Pepper who is attending Mt. Allison returned to the Island yesterday.

The prevalent price of pork in Charlottetown is now ranging from 54 to 6 cents.

HARRY BRINE, the popular clerk of the Hotel Victoria, left last night for Canoe where he will spend Christmas at his home.

MISS MIRIAM NORTON, daughter of B. B. Norton, leaves shortly for Newport, R. I., where she will enter upon the study of nursing.

Rev. Wm. Penna, pastor of Wesley Memorial Church, Moncton has accepted a call to Shediac and will be succeeded by Rev. H. E. Thomas, Campbellton.

J. Walter Jones and J. C. Ballum, Mount Allison, were passengers by the Minto yesterday, the former from St. John and the latter from Dalhousie College.

The annual Christmas concert of St. James Sunday School takes place to-night. A good program of instrumental and vocal music will be given after which Santa Claus will appear on the scene. Come and bring the children.

The funeral of the late Thomas D. Rogers took place from Fairholm yesterday afternoon to People's Cemetery. Despite the very cold weather there was an exceptionally large attendance of Militia, Fraternal Societies and friends. The services were conducted at the house by the Rev. William Dobson and at the grave by the Masons. The services were solemn and impressive. Many beautiful floral tributes testified to the general esteem in which deceased was held.

Says a St. John's, Nfld., paper of late date - A wire came to the city today stating that the steamer Louisburg, Captain Gould, had put into Trepassy last evening, having had a terrific passage of 41 1/2 days from Sydney. She has a full load of coal for the Reid Newfoundland Company's station at Lewisport. The vessel had rounded Cape Race when the gale of Saturday morning was encountered and she was driven 100 miles to sea. The ship was battered terribly; lost one boat and all deckgear moveable, having skylights broken up, windows smashed and wrecked above water badly.

JOHN R. DAVIES has been reinstated as assistant purser of the steamer Minto. Mr. Davies has received a telegram from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to report again for service.

MISS MAGGIE SELLAR leaves next Monday morning for Winnipeg where she will be a principal in a happy event in which Lemuel McLeod, formerly of this city and now of La Combe will share.

The tugs Alert and Weatherspoon owned by Hugh McDonald, contractor, of this city, have arrived in port from Charlottetown. They will go into winter quarters at the old market wharf. Both tugs have been engaged in Mr. McDonald's work at P. E. Island for the past several months.—Sydney Record.

Give Summerside a boat but give us two boats, for one boat cannot handle the freight promptly. The new ice steamer for the St. Lawrence could be used down here through the winter, and sent up the St. Lawrence to do the spring work without working any hardship to the St. Lawrence route."

DURING the past two days the sudden fall in temperature to the lowest this season has convinced the people that winter is really here. Yesterday morning the coldest registered was zero, all day it hovered around that point, last night at eight o'clock it was five below and this morning at four it had reached eight below.

DEALERS in turkeys in Halifax are asking from 22c to 25c per pound in Halifax. Not only is price of turkeys high, but poultry has gone up, for geese \$1.50 is asked, chickens are quoted at 20c per pound, and ducks from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per pair. Some poultry speculators have a large supply of birds on hand, which they have not yet marketed, trying to hold out for further advance in price.
