Papers followed downward with St. Lawrence 1-4 of a point easier and Bathurst 1-8 lower. Among the utilities, Montreal Power was the only strong point, rising 3-8. ISLANDER DEAD

Word has been received recently of the death in Sacramento, California, of Justin Kane, formerly of Morell, P.E.I. Mr. Kane served with honors in the World War. At the age of 19, he enlisted with the 24th Battalion, C.E.F. He spent twenty-two months in the trenches, and while taking part with his battalion in the battle of Vimy Ridge was twice wounded and gassed. He was honorably discharged on July 15, 1918. In 1926 his health impaired as a result of a recurrence of the deadly gas effects. It was necessary that he be sent to California where he remained until his death. He leaves five brothers and one sister, all residing in Boston, Massachusetts, and one brother living in Morell. He was 44.

(By Frederick Gardner) (Associated Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, June 13—Industrial stocks wilted under light selling showers in today's market. Transfers amounted to 326,800 shares compared with 406,370 Friday. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 9 points at 382.3. Speculative forces were in a consolation from the fact important stock holdings re-use to come out on the downside and that for several weeks activity has been brisker when prices tilted upward.

ROTARY

At the Rotary luncheon yesterday the speaker was Rotarian Dr. Harold Shaw, of the Provincial Hospital, who gave an address illustrated with a movie film "Tuberculosis."

After making brief reference to the history of the disease, he said that in Canada in one year there were 67,000 cases, the average age being the early twenties.

He discussed the sanatorium movement, and said that during the last ten years the Island had a percentage decrease in deaths due to tuberculosis of 29 per cent, but the nine provinces had a decrease of 37.9 per cent. Saskatchewan had a percentage decrease during the past ten years of 46 per cent. His per capita yearly cost of treatment is 76.7 cents, whilst in Prince Edward Island it is about 38.6 cents.

He said that the cost of treatment in the sanatorium is inversely proportional to the condition the patient is in when he is admitted. In other words, the lighter the case, the less the bill.

During the past few weeks, through the co-operation and perceptive words of the Minister of Public Health, and the Provincial Sanatorium, the T. B. League Dr. Shaw was allowed to test about 270 children in two schools, Morell and Rustico. He described how the test was made and what it revealed.

Dr. Shaw also said that the disease will attack any part of the body, but that the crippled children's work aided by the Rotary, he said it may be of interest to know that out of the total number of bone casts handled by the clinic 65 were of the chest.

In further dealing with the sanatorium movement, where both surgery and treatment might be given out, he said there was a theory that the minimum of T. B. patient was that if a time and treated, a long tedious and expensive route was followed to a cure.

Some may say that the dry climate of the west is ideal for the treatment of T. B., but this is no longer a medical theory, nor was it ever a proven fact.

Saskatchewan's decrease in mortality may be attributed in a measure to the fact that the sanatorium in that province provide about 2-1/2 per cent of the minimum of accommodation for any given area. In Prince Edward Island the accommodation is approximately one bed per death.

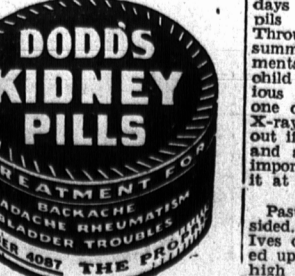

DR. SHAW'S TEST

In describing the test of school children at Morell and Rustico, Dr. Shaw said that the test used is one known for its accuracy with slight variation in technique. The substance used, instead of being injected under the skin with a needle, is applied to the skin under a piece of adhesive tape. This is attached to the forearm and left in place for 48 hours. At the end of that time it is removed and a re-examination of the area that individual has had, or has at present, some tuberculosis involvement in his body.

For the individual that reacts negatively nothing more need be done, but if the arm shows a small red area the individual must have the benefit of a clinical or X-ray examination, to find out if he has handled and cured his slight infection at some time or other.

At the Morell School there was a comparatively low percentage of reactors. At the other school it was much higher. The next few days it is proposed to test 600 pupils at Prince Street School. Throughout the remainder of the summer he hoped that arrangements may be made whereby each child that shows signs of previous infection may be brought to one of the various centres where X-ray is procurable and there find out if he has activity in his lungs, and also, perhaps what is equally important, where is the source. Is it at home or in school.
